Tonight the York All Stars are holding their first workout of the season, but it is not on the ice. The prospective players for what is considered will be the best hockey team in these parts for many years, will play ground hockey on the floor of the Armoury under the direction of their playing coach, "Bud" Steen. So, it looks as if stiff competition amongst the players will force those who make the first game to step fast in order to hold their positions.

Organization work is being carried on energetically by Manager Ralph Boyce and enthusiasm is becoming more prevalent every day in the hockey prospects for the season. Several prominent citizens of Fredericton and Marysville have already promised their financial support in the new team's ventures. Although the team has not yet selected the pattern of their new uniforms it is expected that they will do so at a meeting this week and have them for the first game in Saint John.

According to word received here yesterday, Fredericton City is not all through with football this year. The recent snowfall seemed to lend new life to the footballers and it is quite probable that City will go to Glace Bay to play Caledonia in the finals of the McCurdy Cup playoffs. The press recently carried reports that Fredericton City had forfeited the final game, but this proved incorrect when it was discovered that Manager Kilburn did not inform the Rugby Union that City was forfeiting, but merely that they could not see their way clear to have the final game here. The first wire was sent to Mr. Kilburn before Caledonia had played the Halifax Wanderers to a mere 9-6 victory, and the wire asked if Fredericton would play CALEDONIA (they didn't even concede Halifax a chance to win) in Glace Bay on Saturday. As it happened the Caledonians had quite a time beating the Wanderers, and did so only by superior penalty kicking. No definite word was forthcoming from the City management regarding their intentions.

The UNB. basketball team—or what is left of it—turned out yesterday afternoon for an organized practice under Coach Doug Gomeroy. Although there were only eight there Doug put them through a P.T. drill and let them practice shooting for awhile. Lester Fires Broadside at Earl Siebert

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—Earl Siebert's version of the holdout difficulties with the management of the New York Rangers has shattered the deep silence shrouding the controversy insofar as Ranger officials are concerned.

When Siebert, chosen for the right defence position on The Canadian Press National Hockey League All-Star team last season, outlined his side of the squabble in a statement at Kitchener two days ago and claimed the Ranger management were doing the holdout act, not Siebert, he drew from Lester Patrick, Ranger mentor and king of Madison Square Garden, a lengthy and illuminating retort.

The big backstop, according to Patrick in an interview with The New York Daily News, demanded \$8,000 for the 1934-35 campaign, although the League top is \$7,000. When he continued to hold out Col. John S. Hammond, recently deposed head of the Garden, capitulated with a compromise.

The Daily News said that the compromise, according to Patrick, was that Siebert receive \$7,000, while another \$1,000 was paid to the youth's father, ostensibly for scouting.

With this arrangement the big Earl announced he was satisfied and slid into uniform.

The Rangers cut him \$2,000 this year, sending a contract for \$5,000 to his home in Kitchener, Ont. Siebert promptly sent it back with a demand that unless he got the \$8,000, the blue shirts could struggle along without his services.

Patrick, who had been very chary discussing the Siebert case, up to yesterday, was moved to open up by a dispatch from Kitchener, in which the recalcitrant was quoted as charging the Rangers were holding out on him and that he was ready to go to work as soon as they did the right thing.

"Maybe Siebert should organize a team of his own and take up the St. Louis Eagle franchise," snorted Patrick. "The \$6,000 we offered him is munificent compared with league salaries. I know at least ten men in the league who are far better than Siebert and who are getting a lot less."

The Rangers need Siebert, there's no doubt of that. Ching Johnson's leg, injured seriously last season, isn't what it should be and if he goes sour there is no adequate replacement. But Lester declared he had made Earl his last offer and that he wouldn't capitulate.

SWEEPSTAKES RACKETEERS ARE BUSY AGAIN

Montreal Authorities Warn Public to Beware of Swindlers

MONTREAL, Nov. 19—The oldest bit of sweepstake trickery in the world is being worked again. This time, in Montreal.

Tickets on the Royal Calcutta Club Lottery, one of the oldest and most famous sweepstakes in the world, is the medium that has already cost the Montreal public thousands of dollars. It is obviously a fake, because there is no such thing as a ticket on the real Royal Calcutta Club Lottery.

This ancient sweepstake, started by British Army Officers in India as a mere domestic bit of chance-taking, later destined to become one of the greatest organizations of the kind ever known, has no tickets. Rather, in the same fashion in which it was started, the Calcutta operates only on numbers, and has but one drawing annually, that being on the Derby run at Epsom Downs, England, in June of each year.

Dwyer Still Withholds Sale of Americans

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—Leo Dandurand and Joe Cattarinch, former owners of the Montreal Canadiens, conferred two hours last night with Bill Dwyer, head of the New York Americans, but no decision was reached regarding a possible sale of the New Yorkers, it was learned.

Dandurand and Cattarinch sought to buy controlling interest from Dwyer who, it is reported, is having financial difficulties with the Americans.

The two left for Montreal late last night and it is understood that the deal is still hanging fire. Dwyer was reported interested in completing the deal, but refused to relinquish complete control.

Under the plan presented, Cattarinch and Dandurand would buy a controlling interest for a reported sum of \$200,000. Dwyer would remain a partner in the venture.

Refusal of Bill Dwyer to give up control of the New York Americans stands as a barrier between the deal with Joe Cattarinch and Leo Dandurand.

The door is left open for negotia-

tons but so many difficulties have been met to date that the partners have left the matter stand till Dwyer is able to make up his mind whether he wishes to sell the club on their terms or not.

Dwyer is willing to form a partnership but while they are willing to have him as partner they demand control. So there the matter rests. Complications regarding the deal are vested in the partial ownership of the club by Red Dutton, while it is said that other obligation somewhat obscured the actual ownership of the organization.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—Col. John S. Hammond, slim, grey-haired hockey maestro, recently ousted from Madison Square Garden ice activities, today had apparently leaped far into the front line in the race for purchasing rights of the New York Americans of the National Hockey League, should owner Bill Dwyer decide to part with the club.

Col. Hammond seem to have outstripped the Montreal combination of Joe Cattarinch and Leo Dandurand, former owners of the Canadiens.

Hammond, who handled the reins when the Amerks introduced the puck sport to Gotham a decade ago, beat the Montrealers and numerous other bidders for Amerk ownership by something like a year, as he admitted today he had taken out an option on the club last winter.
