Will Press Dominion Cabinet to Have Headquarters at Moncton and Railway Operated as it Was Previous to 1912.

Two Cents Per Copy

The New Brunswick Government will seek to have the former status of the old Intercolonial restored and the railway operated as it was previous to 1912, with the control centered at Moncton. The government will press the Dominion Cabinet to take action at once in this regard, according to a statement given to the press today by Premier Hon. A. A. Dysart.

Mr. Dysart claims that New Brunswick shippers, producers and importers have been sacrificed, and that this province has suffered ecohomically by the change made in 1912. when the operation was handed over to the Canadian National Railways.
