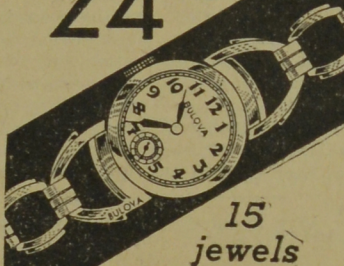

A wonderful illustrated lecture was
given in the Baptist church last even-
ing by Rev. Richard Oliver of the
Sudan Interior Mission, in Central
Nigeria, the British colony of tropical
West Africa, containing 373,000 square
miles and 19,500,000 people. His mis-
sion is among the Gbari tribe, whose
religion is Animism of the grossest
and lowest type. He showed pictures
illustrating the native dress, occupa-
tions, mud huts, and the leprosy and
the loathsome diseases, which latter
are being gradually eliminated by
modern medicine and hygiene. Many
have been converted to Christianity.
The native evangelists support them

selves until they are looked after by
their converts. All native Christians
give a full tenth of their income to
God's work. Mr. Oliver spoke on the
same subject on Sunday morning and
afternoon. He has been working in
Nigeria for years and is now in Can-
ada on furlough necessary because of
the severe climate, in which white
people can live only by taking five
grains of quinine every day and boil-
ing and filtering every drop of water
used.

**HEPBURN TO
ALLOW BRUCE
TO STAY ON**

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—The Toronto
Star said yesterday: "Because it
would be construed in some quarters
as a direct attack on the present Lieut-
enant-Governor, Hon. Dr. H. A. Bruce
the Ontario Government is now plan-
ning to allow him to remain in Chorley
Park (the official residence) until the
end of his term of office. The Star
learned at Queen's Park."
As the Hephburn Government has
not allowed in the budget, for main-
tenance of the residence after October
31, the paper recalls there had been
reports that the property would be
sold or abandoned after that date.

**Permits to Milk
Dealers, Stores
Extended to 1936**

Notice is given in this week's Royal
Gazette that the New Brunswick
Dairy Products Commission has es-
tablished the Hartland, N. B. area to
include the town of Hartland. Also
that on and after October 24 permit
holders in the Saint John area pur-
chasing milk or cream for re-sale as
milk or cream shall be entitled to
purchase at the wholesale price. The
New Brunswick Dairy Products Com-
mission has ruled further that after
December 15, in the Saint John area,
a store bottle with the word "store"
and "5-cent deposit" embossed on
neck and a large "S" embossed on
bottom shall be used exclusively in
stores or any place from which in
turn milk or cream is re-sold in its
original container. A deposit of five
cents shall be made by the store to
the milk dealer and by the purchaser
to the store for each and every such
store bottle.

It has also been ordered that per-
mits issued by the New Brunswick
Dairy Products Commission to milk
dealers, producer-suppliers and stores
for periods ending October 31, 1935,
are extended to cover the year ending
October 31, 1936, providing the hold-
ers of such permits have complied
with the requirements of the Dairy
Products Act and regulations made
thereunder.

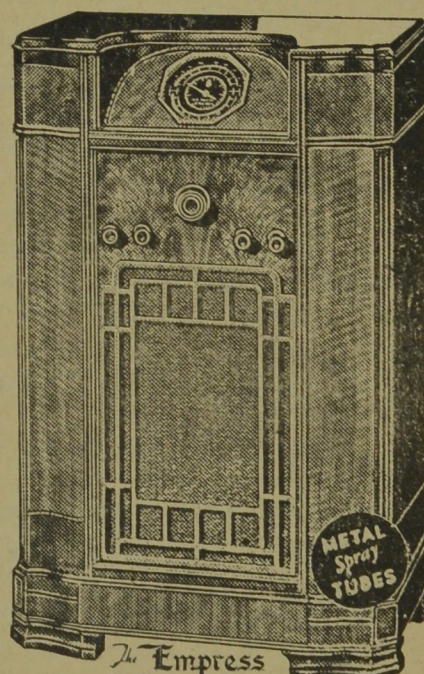
