wards your Fatherland during the past 15 years. The Reich throws its gates wide open for you."

LONDON, Jan. 16—The results of the Saar plebiscite were welcomed in Great Britain today, officials seeking a possibility of getting Germany back into the League of Nations and the extension of a general European security pact.

There had been uneasiness that slices of the territory might have voted against reunion with the Reich, leading to complications.

Germany's success in the league-sponsored Saar elections may incline her to accept the British plan for bringing her back to Geneva, governmental circles believed.

Great Britain, it was pointed out, considers Germany's return to Geneva essential for European pacifications, as well as an indispensable adjunct to the Rome accords and the settlement of the Saar problem.

One of the plans to this end, drafted by Foreign Ministry experts, calls for the Allied Powers to drop military advantages accruing to them under the Treaty of Versailles and would permit the losing nations to request Geneva to be allowed to benefit by this renunciation.

He thought an investigation, advisable. Some regulation of the domestic marketing of livestock was desirable and voluntary regulation would be best.

C. L. Sypher, of this city suggested that stabilization of the dollar might offer a solution.

J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture and chairman of the New Brunswick Marketing Board, speaking on the farmer's responsibility in solving his marketing problems, declared changing conditions had brought about a situation where the marketing of farm products was in the hands of a few large companies with the few men in control not in close touch with producers. The farmers themselves should tackle the problem.

Producers were beginning to organize to control the marketing of their products and distributors were beginning to realize the benefits. The responsibility of the producer was to inform himself as definitely as possible so that he might decide what marketing steps were best to adopt.

If prices continued high, the Natural Products Marketing Act would never be heard of. The foundation of any marketing scheme was the support given it by the producers.

The bombardment of requests from all parts of Canada to the board set up under the act indicated a general dissatisfaction with conditions. Approval had been given already under the act to the British Columbia Tree Fruit Board, the Apple Export Board, the British Columbia Shingle Group, the British Columbia Salt Fish Organization and the Ontario Tobacco Growers. Any opposition to proposed marketing schemes should be considered carefully, but when the scheme was adopted, all must observe the regulations set up, Mr. King declared.

Marketing boards would not in his opinion be a panacea to cure all the producers' ills, but they would be a step together with hard work, in bettering the marketing situation.

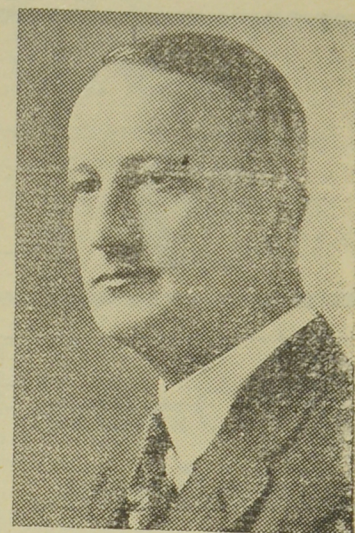
MRS. C. A. WOODS WINS DAILY MAIL'S SILVER SERVICE

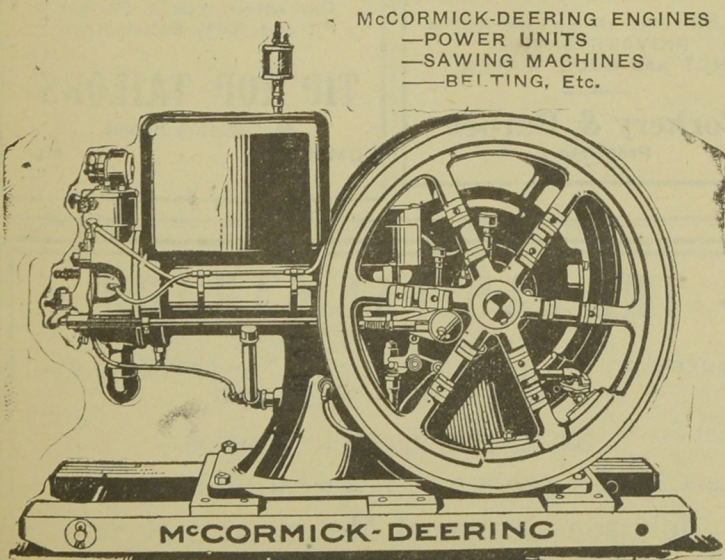
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
