

### ARTHUR J. McEVOY ELECTED MAYOR BY ACCLAMATION

New Chief Magistrate  
of Devon Popular In  
Civic Politics

Yesterday was nomination day in Devon town politics with three changes made in the personnel of the board for the ensuing year. There will be no election as each of the three new members took office by acclamation.

Alderman Arthur J. McEvoy, one of the most popular and efficient members at the board for the past number of years, was elected mayor and will succeed A. Wilfred Coombes, who has retired. The others elected were Roy E. Flowers, of South Devon who will fill the vacancy vacated by Ald. McEvoy, who takes the post of mayor; and Gerald Ashfield, of North Devon, who will replace Alderman William Jaffrey in Ward 3. Ald. Jaffrey completes thirty years of service in Devon civic politics and is now retiring because of ill-health.

#### Elected Saturday

The aldermen who accepted re-nomination were Gilbert Henry, in Ward 1; H. D. Dobie and Reuben Ladds in Ward 2; Herbert Bailey, Ward 3; and Earle M. Young and W. D. Boone, in Ward 4. These and the above will be declared elected by acclamation on Saturday by Whitman A. Haines, the town clerk and treasurer.

Mayor Coombes had served for the past three years as chief magistrate of civic affairs in Devon. Mayor McEvoy has had a long and enviable record at the council board and his appointment as mayor will be learned with pleasure all over the province. Mayor McEvoy combines a fine business integrity as well as splendid personal qualities.

At noon recess the members adjourned to the Dominion Experimental Farm where luncheon was served by the Federal agricultural officials. This afternoon's session was carried on at the Station, C. F. Bailey, superintendent, delivering an address on "Prevention and Control of Livestock Parasites."

Addresses this morning were given by A. R. Jones, manager of the Maritime Co-Operative Egg and Poultry Exchange, his subject being "Marketing Problems in the Poultry Industry"; F. L. Wood, provincial poultry supt., who spoke on "The Poultry Industry As It Should be"; William Kerr, N. B. Senior Poultry Fieldman, who delivered an interesting address on "The Import-

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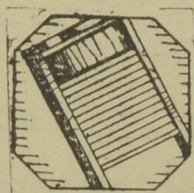
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
