## Maestro Inspired By Marie Dressler

CHICAGO, Illinois, May 23—If it hadn't been for Marie Dressler, the late famed motion picture actress, Charles Gaylord might not be conductor for the Penthouse Serenade programs heard with Don Mario Sunday afternoons over an NBC-WEAF. It was Miss Dressler whose advice, sympathy, encouragement, spurred Gaylord as a young bandsman to start out on his own.

Gaylord first met Miss Dressler, while he was assistant director of Paul Whiteman's orchestra, during the band's European tour. The friendship was later revived in Hollywood, while both were in motion picture work.

It was on the west coast that Gaylord, at Miss Dressler's suggestion, took his first step toward organizing a musical outfit of his own. And when he did open in Pittsburgh with his own band, the first telegram of congratulation was from Miss Dressler.

Gaylord's orchestra is heard on the Penthouse Serenade programs each Sunday at 3:30 P. M., A. S. T.

## Crook Returns To Air For Popular Concert May 27

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 23—Richard Crooks, famous Metropolitan Opera singer, fully recovered from his recent illness, will return to the air for the first time in two months as the featured soloist on the Voice of Firestone concert over an NBC-WEAF network on Monday, May 27 at 8:30 P. M., A. S. T.

The popular young American tenor, who is one of the most active and athletic of radio stars, was operated on for appendicitis early in March. Recently he resumed his concert engagements and next week he will be heard again in the Voice of Firestone series.

Upon his return to the air the celebrated tenor will offer Foster's "Come Where My Love Lies Dreaming", "Tosti's 'Parted'", "My Little Nest of Heavenly Blue" by Lehar and "E Lucevan Le Stelle" from "Tosca", as solos.

Crooks also will be heard with Margaret Speaks, young American soprano, in "O Soave Pancia" from "La Boheme", and with a male chorus in Schubert's "Great is Jehovah". The chorus also will sing "The Soldiers' Farewell" and William Daly's orchestra will complete the program with Mozowski's "Bolero".

Jack Fulton, popular young tenor, has again convinced the sponsor of his CBS programs that woman enjoy music with their housework. During his recent theatrical tour of the metropolitan New York area, Fulton broke all house records for feminine attendance.

## Gypsies Hosts To Ruth Etting And Bea Lillie

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 23—Ruth Etting and Beatrice Lillie, two of radio's most celebrated women, will be the guests of the A & P Gypsies at future Monday night broadcasts over an NBC-WEAF network at 9:00 P. M., A. S. T.

Miss Lillie, noted British comedienne, will be heard with Harry Horlick, and the Gypsy orchestra on Monday, May 27, and Miss Etting blues singer, was heard at the broadcast on Monday, May 20.

Both Miss Etting and Miss Lillie are well known to NBC audiences. Miss Etting, one of the most celebrated blues singers of stage, screen and air, has been starred in the Ziegfeld Follies and in many Hollywood productions.

Miss Lillie has been featured on the stage on both sides of the Atlantic, and is famous for her comedy monologues. Both she and Miss Etting are currently heard in their own series of NBC broadcasts.

Harry Horlick and his popular Gypsy orchestra, which has been playing for NBC listeners for more than eleven years, is heard at each of the weekly broadcasts. The orchestra features popular and semi-classical selections.

Among the sponsors who have been negotiating for Virginia Rea's services is a nationally-known manufacturer for whom she appeared on the air for eight months a few years ago. The sponsor still receives letters praising her voice.

BERLIN, May 22—Two Catholic nuns today were sentenced to penitentiary terms for admitted violations of Nazi Germany's strict foreign exchange law.

The two were Marie Menke, Sister Neophytia, 56 year old prioress general of the Order of St. Augustine, and Gertrud Down, Sister Englatia, 57 year old treasurer of the order.



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
