

COLONIZATION PROVIDED FOR IN SUMMER PLAN

Scheme Should be Great
Benefit to This Part
of Province

Chance To Farm

New Road Five Miles In
Length Will Be
Opened Up

A colonization scheme which should prove of great benefit to this section of the province will be proceeded with during the coming summer. In connection with this scheme a new road five miles in length from Bailey, Sunbury county, running through and connecting with the Broad Road, is now being surveyed out under the direction of Major T. C. Barker, of the Provincial highway department.

In addition to opening up about one hundred lots of new country in one of the finest farming districts in the province, the road will provide shorter connection with the railroad for farmers residing on the Broad Road and will give the residents of Fredericton Junction and Tracy a much shorter and easier road to Saint John as it will avoid the hills in the vicinity of South Branch and Welsford.

From a colonization standpoint this new area of farming country should present exceptionally good opportunities for any energetic young man who wishes to start farming on his own hook. During the past couple of years several new settlements have been opened up in the northern part of the province and in those sections where the people are willing to work they have made good even under the present economic conditions.

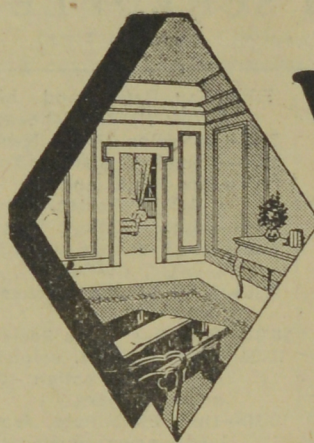

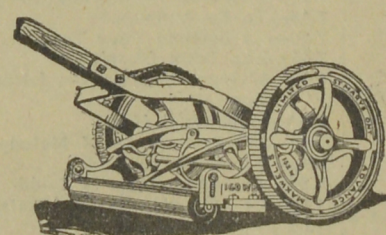
