DRAMATIZE STORY OF CLARA BARTON

NEW YORK April 9—The story of Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross, will be told in a series of Roses and Drums episodes beginning with the broadcast over an NBC-WJZ network on Sunday, April 14, at 6.00 p.m., AST.

One of the great heroines of all time, Miss Barton braved the conventions or the '60's to walk with armies and minister to the wounded. A lady of mercy, suffering men learned to call her the 'Angel of the Battlefield.'

The first efforts of Miss Barton to overcome the opposition of authorities to her plan for giving direct aid to the wounded on the battlefields will be described in the opening episode, which reaches its climax as she comes upon the sanguinary arena of Antietam. The heroine's fortitude, perseverance and sympathy for the suffering will be portrayed in this and succeeding broadcasts in the series sponsored by the Union Central Life Insurance Company.

"HOUR OF CHARM" SHIFTS TO NEW TIME ON CBS

The "Hour of Charm," presenting the popular all-girl musical show under the direction of Phil Spitalny, will be heard at a new time over the coast-to-coast WABC-Columbia network beginning tonight from 10.30 to 11.00 P.M., AST. (Formerly heard on Thursday from 9.00 to 9.30 P.M., AST.)

The program features one of the most unusual musical units ever to come to the air—a 32-piece all-girl orchestra recruited by Spitalny from many states in a two-year talent search. Each of these girls is a talented singer as well as musician, and they are heard doubling as a glee club, as well as in combination vocal and instrumental novelties.

Maxine, the featured songstress of the program, is heard with the harmony trio of Lilyan, Anne and Mary; Evelyn Kaye, concert maestra; Gypsy Cooper, saxophonist; and Pat Harrington, trumpeter, are among the featured instrumentalists. Rosaline Green, prominent radio actress, acts as mistress-of-ceremonies.

Ford Frick, newly elected president of the National League, and William Harridge, will be the guest speakers at the first Friday program, and will discuss the forthcoming baseball season for the radio audience.

Frick will speak from the NBC Radio City studios, in which Miss Etting and Nichols' band will present their portion of the broadcast, and Harridge will face a microphone in the NBC Chicago studios.

For the musical program Miss Etting and Nichols will have a selection of old and new favorite tunes which will occupy a major portion of the half hour broadcast.

NEW YORK, April 9—Gladys Swarthout, Metropolitan Opera star, was the featured soloist at the Voice of Firestone broadcast over an NEC-WEAF network last night at 9.30 p.m. William Daly's Symphonic String orchestra and a male chorus was also heard on the half hour program.

Miss Swarthout sang "In My Garden," by Isabelle Firestone; "The Cradle and the Music Box;" Franck's "Panis Angelicus" and Romberg's "When I Grow Too Old to Dream." In addition she sang a duet with Margaret Spears, "Oh That We Two Were Maying." The chorus offered Schumann's "Traumerei," and "The Heavens Proclaim Him" by Beethoven. "When Day is Done" was played by the orchestra.
