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VOCATIONAL NIGHT CLASSES HAD CLOSING

The closing of the vocational night classes at Fredericton high school took place this week and proved a most successful one, with the exhibits of the work in all the classes being especially fine. Among those present at the closing were Dr. G. C. Vanwart, chairman of the Board of School Trustees; H. W. McFee, R. D. Hanson, secretary; W. K. Tibert vocational director for the province, and Rev. John Linton, and others.

A feature of this year's course was the lectures to a class of boys from the relief range, on lumber scaling. This course proved highly successful with the young men deriving much benefit from them.

The success in the various departments was outstanding. In dressmaking, unit two, which was conducted by Miss Gladys Miller, the making-over of garments was specialized and those present the other evening were impressed with the workmanship shown. In unit three, Mrs. George Pugh taught her class the making over of dresses, coats, children's coats, rompers, etc., and this exhibit was also a fine one. The shorthand class, conducted by Mrs. Louise Bailey had made excellent progress and some of the students qualified for speed certificates. Miss Marion Ryan in the typewriting department also had shown progress with her students. General education, motor mechanics and woodwork all indicated greater interest taken and in the cooking department with Miss Mary McMullen as the instructor new and more economical ways of cooking were taught. In handicraft, Miss Burpee instructor, exhibits of card and loom weaving, designing and felt applique, tapestry and embroidery, blockprinting, pewter etching, lamp shades, leather tooling, stamping, were some of the subjects taught.

The eleven classes carried on during the term with pupils, were as follows: Bookkeeping, 17; shorthand 13; typing, 25; general education, 8; lumber scaling, 7; motor mechanics, 18; woodworking, 8; clothing, unit two, 9, unit three 11; cooking, 6.

During the evening R. C. Bingham of Colombo, Ceylon, spoke to the students lecturing on how tea is cultivated in Ceylon and illustrating his remarks with pictures of that country. He told also of school customs in Ceylon and his remarks were most interesting.

Campbellton Bill Meets with Opposition

gouche, and the selling and distribution of power in the County of Restigouche.

Damage Suit

Mr. Kerr explained the bill fully and clearly, stating that sections 24 and 25 of Chapter 58 of the Acts of Assembly 60 Victoria were not clear enough in their statements regarding the rights of the town in this respect. He cited a recent damage suit brought against the town which involved these sections and where judgment although in favor of the town, was rather vague. Thus, he stated the rights of the town should be made clearer.

C. S. O. Crocket strenuously opposed the bill on the grounds that Campbellton could not finance the construction of the equipment and further, that the town should have no right to sell electricity outside the town limits.

Premier Speaks

Mr. Kerr, chairman of the N. B. Public Utilities Board, stated that the Town of Campbellton owned and operated its plant and did not come under the jurisdiction of the Board. Mr. Crocket stated that the people should have the right to appeal to the Board because the rates were excessive. Mr. Crocket continued on a long address to the committee and when he had completed his case Premier Tilley stated that Mr. Crocket had brought out some important facts. "I hope to see the day when the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission will sell electricity at cost all over the Province," stated the Premier. He suggested that the committee hear what men like Mr. Reilly and Mr. Stewart had to say. He further added that if this jurisdiction was granted to the Town of Campbellton it would cost that much more to absorb the rights for the N. B. Electric Power Commission when the province reached its ideal.

Others Advise

Hon. E. A. Reilly advised the committee in considering the bill to keep in mind the rights of the people and the N. B. Electric Power Commission.

Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, stated that he agreed that the commission should maintain its right to grant or refuse sanction to any extension. He felt that the bill only asked for confirmation of what the town has previously done.

Mr. Kerr stated that Mr. Stewart was correct in his support of the bill.

The bill was referred for consideration in private session.

Another Bill

Another bill relating to the Town of Campbellton was explained by Mr. Kerr as giving the town council authority to extend the term of office of the mayor and councillors from one to two years. Mr. Crocket opposed the bill, which was referred to private session.

The Committee will re-assemble at 8 p.m. tonight and in the event of a night session in the Legislature, immediately after the session.

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FORMER MONCTON ALDERMAN DIES

Camille H. Belliveau, 67, Passes Away After a Lengthy Illness

MONCTON, March 20—Camille H. Belliveau, 67, a former merchant and for three years an alderman of the City Council board, and deputy mayor, died at the home of his niece, Mrs. E. C. Saulnier, 30 First Street, here, last evening, following a lengthy illness.

For many years Mr. Belliveau was a prominent member of Moncton's business life and was keenly interested in many projects, and was an excellent musician. Of late years he was not very active in a business way but maintained an active interest in civic affairs. In 1921, 1923 and 1924 he was a city alderman, and was deputy mayor during those years.

He is survived by four brothers and two sisters as well as by two nieces in Saint John, Mrs. Saulnier, with whom he resided, and Mrs. H. Goguen. His brothers and sisters are residents of the United States.

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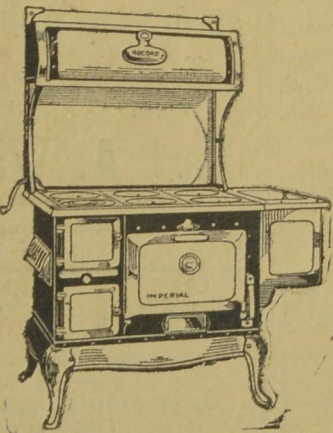
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
