

ONE OF POPULAR STOREKEEPERS DIES IN CITY

Charles F. Marsh, Aged 50, Passed Away Here This Morning

Kept Store 25 Years

Deceased Was Highly Respected; Funeral to Be Held on Friday

Charles Frederick Marsh, aged 50 years, who had kept a general store at Regent Street for the past number of years, passed away early this morning after a short illness. He had been in poor health for some time. The late Mr. Marsh had kept a store in this city for the past twenty five years and more and was very well known. His death will be widely regretted.

He is survived by his wife, Hilda E. Marsh, one adopted son, Percy LeRoy, one sister, Mrs. Bert Kale, of Montreal and one brother, Albert Marsh of England.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon with prayers at the home at 1:30 o'clock and at Christ-church Parish church at two o'clock. Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate will conduct the service and interment will be made in the Rural cemetery extension.

Many years ago, when he was still a young man, the late Mr. Marsh came to this city and set up in business for himself. By dint of effort, perseverance, and honest business principles he solidly built up a flourishing little business. Those who traded with Mr. Marsh knew they could always get satisfaction and fair dealing which is more than can be said of some of the larger combines today.

The late Mr. Marsh came from England and in this city he has earned the esteem and respect of all.

CAMPBELLTON BILL MEETS WITH OPPOSITION

Six Bills Considered By Municipalities Committee Today

Four Recommended

Two for Private Session, Opposing Argument A Lengthy One

Presenting a case in opposition to a bill relating to the town of Campbellton, C. S. O. Crockett succeeded this morning in having the bill referred for private discussion tonight by the Municipalities Committee. Mr. Crockett's argument against the bill occupied over one hour and a half at this morning's meeting. Hugh A. Kerr, solicitor for the Town of Campbellton, supported the bill.

In brief the bill, if passed, would ratify the right of the town to extend and sell electricity to points in Restigouche county outside the town limits. The town has already done this under an act passed in 1897, but Mr. Carr stated that the legislation of that date left some doubt as to certain points concerning the town's rights.

Of the six bills considered by the committee four were recommended and two were deferred for private discussion. E. C. Atkinson, M.P.P. for Sunbury county, occupied the chair.

First Bill

The first bill was one to authorize the county council of the municipality of Kings to fix for a period of twenty years from Jan. 1, 1936, an amount in lieu of the annual amount assessable by the council upon the town of Sussex equal to 14 per cent annually of the total amount assessable on the whole county. A. J. Brooks, government member from Kings, explained the bill was based on an agreement. The bill was recommended.

A bill to authorize the town of Sussex to issue debentures in an amount not exceeding \$12,000 for permanent construction of main street was recommended.

A bill to authorize the Town of Campbellton to issue debentures in an amount not exceeding \$30,000 to be used and applied for the purpose of capital expenditure in the improvement of its electric light system, including the construction of a new substation was recommended. Hugh A. Kerr, K.C., town solicitor, explained the bill, stating that changes were necessary. It is intended that the issue be redeemed in ten years without raising the electric light rates.

The next bill was An Act to authorize the Trustees of School District No. 1, Parish of Madawaska, County of Madawaska, to effect temporary loans not exceeding \$10,000 was recommended as amended.

Campbellton Bill

The next bill, intitled An Act relating to the Town of Campbellton, involved considerable discussion. C. S. O. Crockett, Campbellton, claimed that the purport of the bill was not properly explained in the advertisement appearing in the papers and that the people were not fully informed of the full object of the bill. Mr. Kerr town solicitor, stated that the purpose of the bill had been stated as fully as possible in the newspapers.

The bill would ratify, confirm and declare legal the action of the Town of Campbellton in having constructed, erected and maintained poles, towers, wires, etc., for transmitting and distributing electric power and energy within the County of Restigouche outside the Town of Campbellton, and in selling and supplying electric power and energy to users in said county, and in short, the maintenance, repair, erection and reconstruction of the equipment in the County of Restigouche.

JUDGMENTS IN N. B. APPEAL COURT TODAY

Conviction Upheld In Appeal of Leo Griffin, of McAdam

February Cases

Appeal Court in Adjourn Sitting Today; Hear Two Cases

The New Brunswick Appeal court sitting in adjourned session here today, delivered three judgments, all of them reserved from the February sitting.

In the appeal in the case of King vs. Leo Griffin, of McAdam, who had been convicted on January 10 on a charge of obstructing a customs officer in the performance of his duty, inflicting injury, the appeal was dismissed and conviction upheld.

Appeal was dismissed in the case of the King vs. Maxime Albert. In the case of the King vs. John Sullivan the judgment was altered to reduce the fine of \$75. to \$25. Sullivan had been found guilty of assault at the original trial. Conviction was quashed in the case of the King vs. Benoit Richard, in which the accused had been convicted on a charge of aiding prostitution and thereby profiting.

The Appeal Court commenced re-argument this afternoon in the case of Minnie Bell Noble vs. The Bath, Bristol and Florenceville Hydro Electric District commissioners.

Court was comprised of Justices Richards, Grimmer and LeBlanc.
