"SHIPS OF JOY"
INAUGURATES
CBS VOYAGE

"Captain Dobbie's Ship of Joy," a long-popular west coast radio feature, will inaugurate its new voyage over the airwaves, carrying a cargo of melody and good cheer, on Tuesday, February 26, from 10.30 to 10.45 P. M., over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network. With "Captain Dobbie" at the helm, and the versatile musical aggregation, Horace Heidt and his Californians, manning the decks, the "Ship of Joy" will be heard every Tuesday and Thursday at that time.

The musical offerings of the program will be presented in a pattern of rich variety, for the Californians include 27 musicians playing a total of 210 instruments; five vocal soloists; three duet combinations; a girl trio; a male quartet, a mixed quintet; a girl sextette and a glee club.

A highlight of the opening program will be a "Vienna Melodies" medley, comprising "My Hero" from "The Chocolate Soldier," Kopak's Viennese March; Kreislers "Caprice Viennois," "Two Hearts in Three-Quarter Time," and "Vilja," from the Merry Widow. Additional selections will include "Stay as Sweet as You Are," and the nautical novelty, "Minnie, the Mermaid." Among the vocal specialty performers will be Lysbeth Hughes, Bob McCoy, Jerry Brown, Alyce King, Art Thorsen and the King Sisters.

MICROPHONICS

Just to be different, the director of the Sigmund Romberg Swift Hour over NBC will present Helen Marshall, the soprano star of the program, as a violin soloist in the full hour broadcast of Saturday, March 9.

"The American public today is hearing the finest performances in the world, not only of symphonic and operatic music, but likewise of so-called 'popular' music. Most of this is yours for the dialing. "UNDERSTANDING
MUSIC" TONIGHT;
FINE ARTISTS

Barbara Maurel, noted concert contralto, and Eugene Dubois, violinist, will be the guest artists of Howard Barlow's "Understanding Music" program featuring excerpts from famous operas to be broadcast over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network on Tuesday, February 26, from 6.30 to 6.55 P. M.

Barlow, with a program comprising many favorite arias from French operas, will first discuss the music informally. Following this introduction, Miss Maurel will sing "Bois Epais," from an early opera by Lulli and a more recent work, the popular melody "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice," from Saint-Saens' opera, "Samson and Delilah."

Eugene Dubois, concertmaster of the Columbia Symphony Orchestra, will play the "Meditation" from Mossonet's opera "Thais," while Barlow will direct the orchestra in the Overture to Thomas' "Mignon," and the "Aragonesa," from Bizet's "Carmen" Suite, No. 1.

will be the group singing of an old Russian Folk song, "The Pedlar," by an audience made up of children from 18 school districts in the Detroit area.

Kolar will devote an interesting program to works by French, Polish, and Russian composers. He will direct the orchestra first in Glinka's overture to "Russian and Ludmilla," followed by Ludmilla's "The Music Box," "The Song of India," from Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Sadko," Chabrier's "Rhapsody Espana," and the "March Miniature" from Tchaikovsky's First Suite, and the same composer's "Song Without Words." The second half of the concert will feature three excerpts from Bizet's "Carmen" including the "March of the Smugglers," "Habanera," and the "Toreador Song." The program will close with Moszkowski's "Malaguena," and Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Caprice Espagnol."
