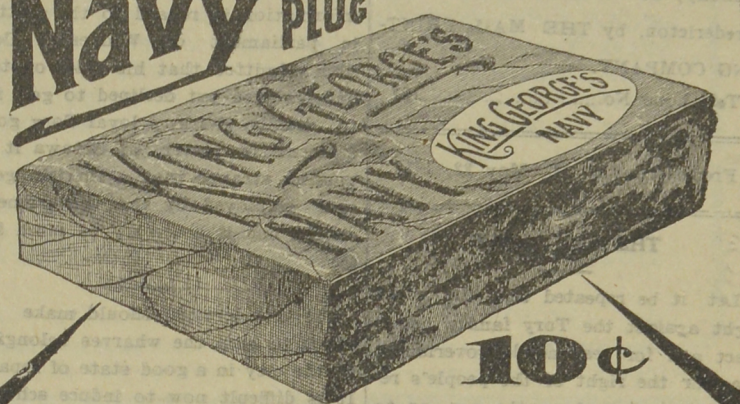
The condition of Otis Skinner, who was operated on for mastoiditis, is improving and his physician looks for a complete recovery.

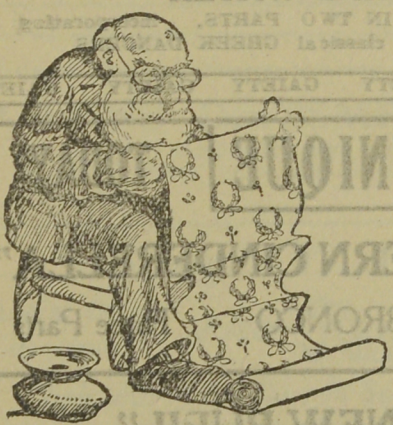
