Calais, Me., May 21—The Maine
 and New Brunswick League series was
 inaugurated here today with a rip-
 ping game between the St. Croixs of
 Calais and St. Stephen, and the
 Marathons of St. John, the border
 representatives of the diamond hand-
 ing a three-run shut-out to the Mara-
 thons in one of the best games wit-
 nessed here. Lee of the St. Croixs,
 held the Marathons down to two
 hits and the team work of the home
 team was excellent.

The attendance was not large on
 account of the cold weather pre-
 vailing, but great enthusiasm has
 been aroused and the success of the
 league is assured so far as the bor-
 der fans are concerned.

Doyle sent Lee to the mound and
 Leonard had Dedrick on the firing
 line. Lee had the better of the pit-
 chers' battle, twirling a steady, heady
 game with a fine change of pace. He
 distinguished himself by allowing
 three men to walk and catching them
 off first and pitching a no-hit
 game until the eighth, when two lone
 singles were secured by Riley to cen-
 tre and Mulligan to left.

Dedrick was touched up for six hits
 and his drop curve was fathomed in
 the fifth when Wildes singled to cen-
 tre, McPherson bunted down the third
 base line. The umpire yelled "Fair
 ball." The St. John third baseman
 claimed a foul and while the players
 remonstrated with the umpire, Wildes
 traveled to third and McPherson to
 second. Gross fied out, Lee fanned,
 Parker, the classy centre-fielder, broke
 the bat over a clean single to centre
 and Wildes and McPherson trotted
 home. Vance fied out, ending the
 inning.

In the seventh, McPherson walked,
 Gross grounded out, McPherson ad-
 vanced to second and to third and
 scored on passed balls. Dedrick was
 replaced by Walsh in the eighth in-
 ning. The only chance St. John had
 of scoring was in the eighth, when
 Bien fied out to Wildes, who turned
 his ankle after making the catch. He
 was replaced by Parker and Spiller
 went to right garden. Hoffman
 grounded out, Riley singled to cen-
 tre, Mulligan doubled to left, ad-
 vancing Riley to third. Shanky
 was used as pinch hitter in place of
 Dedrick and fied out to left. The
 game was an errorless one.

was over 800 and the weather condi-
 tions were perfect. Both the teams
 showed promise of excellent work
 later on and the local fans are well
 pleased with the material that
 Manager Magoon has gotten togeth-
 er. Lack of time for practice was
 alone to be blamed for whatever
 ragged playing and slow ball that
 was evident.

On account of the work of Hanley
 the official umpire, the officials of
 the Bangor association ate to make
 a protest to the league. The Bangor
 fans all but mobbed Hanley at the
 end of the game and had it not been
 for the fact that President Utter-
 back of the local club, detailed a
 policeman to look after him, it is
 more than probable that he would
 have been roughly handled. Bangor
 took the lead in the first inning,
 scoring three men, and kept it up
 until the eighth was over, taking
 three more in the fourth. Frederic-
 ton at that time had but five, hav-
 ing taken two in the third, one in
 the fifth and one in the sixth. Freder-
 iction put in Ahern, a Southpaw
 pitcher, in the last of the fifth and
 from then on Bangor got but one hit
 and failed to score again.

Fredericton piled on three more
 runs in the first of the ninth, and
 Bangor failed to add to its six, the
 game ending with a score of 8 to 6
 in Fredericton's favor.

Footo, the second baseman; Le-
 brack, the catcher; Tewhey, the
 shortstop, and Hammond, the centre-
 field, were the particularly bright
 and shining lights for Bangor. For
 Fredericton, Ahern, the left-handed
 pitcher, excelled all others, although
 the team shows that there is good
 stuff in it. There is every reason to
 believe that the success of the league
 so far as the local team is concern-
 ed, is assured. There will undoubt-
 edly be several changes in the per-
 sonnel, which will tend to strength-
 en, and will be made as soon as the
 right material can be found.
