TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

 16, 1892.)

BROUGHT HOME—Miss Nellie
 Allen has been brought home from
 Shediak, where she has been ill with
 typhoid fever. She is recovering.

THE BEST BEEF—The farmers of
 Kingsclear will be pleased to learn
 that the best beef on sale at St.
 John during the Easter week is from
 that parish.

NEW JUDGE—Hon. D. L. Han-
 nington was sworn in on Wednesday
 by Chief Justice Allen, a judge of the
 Supreme Court and took his seat on
 the bench.

GETTING BETTER—Mr. John Mc-
 Donald, one of the well known mer-
 chants of this city, has been quite
 ill for some time past but his symp-
 toms are becoming more favorable.

BRIDGE BUILT—Robert Logan,
 who has charge of the construction of
 the Eel River bridge, expects to
 complete it by the middle of next
 week.

THEY STAY HERE—The Mon-
 ton Transcript is bragging because
 a robin has made its appearance
 there. These birds like Fredericton
 and its surroundings so well that
 they remain here all winter.

CLAN GORDON—Donald Wylie, the
 braw pier of Clan Gordon, is to be
 fitted out with a first-class set of
 bagpipes. The order has been placed
 with J. F. McMurray and the music
 is to arrive today.

THE FIRST TUG—The Eva John-
 son, R. A. Essey's tug, is the first
 vessel to get at work here this sea-
 son. She took a trial trip on Thurs-
 day. Thoroughly refitted and repair-
 ed, she is now in good shape for the
 summer's work. (The Eva Johnson
 is still in commission, now being
 owned by Capt. Martin Currier of
 Oromocto. She was the first steamer
 to arrive this season.)

 Wednesday half way across the river,

 from the bridge. It was worth only

 Southampton.

PRINCE WILLIAM RAILWAY—The
 incorporation of the Trunk Line Rail-
 way Company for the construction of
 a through line from St. John to
 Edmundston now makes it probable
 that the Prince William section will
 be put under construction at once.
 As it stands at present the company
 having control of this portion of the
 road must begin and continue con-
 struction within the year or the
 road will be built by the Trunk Line.
 The Centreville Railway will likely
 also be a part on of the through line.

FOUND DEAD—Edward Peters, a
 colored man in the employ of Ben-
 jamin Kilburn of flingsclear, was
 found dead in his bed Tuesday. He
 was about seventy years of age and
 had been with Mr. Kilburn for over
 fifty years, a faithful, industrious
 old man.

CAPT. ROBINSON'S DEATH—The
 death of Capt. W. H. Robinson on
 Friday, 18th ult., is announced. He
 was killed in an engagement at
 Tambo, Sierra Leone. Capt. Robin-
 son was a native of Fredericton and
 a graduate of the Royal Military
 College of Canada. He commanded
 the Royal Engineers at Sierra Leone.

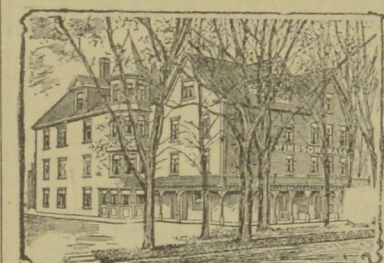

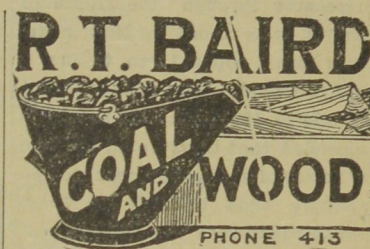
