

BIG STEEL MERGER  
IS ON THE TAPIS

Boston, Jan. 8--Last night's Transcript publishes the following:

Special despatches to The Transcript from Montreal and Ottawa indicate that steady progress is being made in the effort to amalgamate the Canadian steel companies and several of the largest independent companies in the United States into a giant concern to be incorporated under the federal laws of Canada as the International Steel Company. Charles M. Schwab, the first president of the United States Steel Company, is said to be at the head of a syndicate of American capitalists who are trying to effect the combination. According to Montreal advices the companies which it is desired to unite are the Dominion Iron & Steel Corporation and the Steel Company of Canada, the two concerns which include most of the Canadian plants, and the following United States companies: The Bethlehem Steel Company, the Youngstown Steel & Tube Company, the Midvale Steel Company, the Pennsylvania Steel Company, the Cambria Steel Company, the Labelle Iron Works and other independent companies.

Reports of effort to make such a combination as outlined above have gained circulation heretofore and been denied. At present the reiteration comes from numerous points and the report is accepted in certain Canadian quarters as true. Although the details of the immense scheme are still in an embryonic stage, it is understood in Canadian circles that holders of Dominion Steel will probably receive around the eighty mark for the common stock, while Steel of Canada will be brought into the organization at an equally attractive figure.

MAJORITY OF STOCK UNDER  
OPTION.

It is said in Montreal that the options on the Canadian stocks desired now reach 63.9 per cent. in the Steel Company of Canada and 53.11 per cent. of the common stock issue of the Dominion Steel Corporation.

According to the plans the capitalization of the new company will be made up as follows:

Preferred stock, \$500,000,000.  
Common, \$400,000,000.  
A bond issue of \$200,000,000.

STEEL COMPANY HAD  
RECORD DECEMBER

December, according to official figures just compiled by the Dominion Iron and Steel Corporation, was the banner month in the company's history, the steel shipments especially being phenomenal.

The latter registered the splendid increase of 9,000 tons, or 75 per cent ahead of the corresponding month in 1911, the figures being 12,600 tons against 12,491 tons.

In the coal department of the Corporation's activity an almost corresponding increase over December 1911, is reported. Last month the output was 295,000 tons and the shipments 276,500 tons, against the respective figures of 225,475 and 249,393 for the same period in 1911.

MAY CHANGE NAME OF  
PROHIBITION PARTY

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 9--A proposal to change the name of the Prohibition party is one of the important matters that will be considered and acted upon at the big national conference of the party leaders to be held in this city early next week. Many of the leaders have expressed themselves in favor of a change in the party designation. The advocates of the proposal argue that the word "prohibition" does not convey the full meaning of the party's purposes. It is pointed out that the present name conveys to the average mind only one idea--the prohibition of the liquor traffic, whereas the party has for years been standing for many of the most important progressive principles which only recently have been taken up by the other political parties. 'Virgil G. Hinshaw, of Chicago, the national chairman, is among those of the opinion that a change in name would result in increasing the moral strength of the party.

The conference here next week will be attended by the members of the national committee, the State chairmen and many other prominent leaders. The recent national campaign and its results will be exhaustively considered with a view to agreeing upon changes in methods or future campaigns. Ways and means for strengthening the party will be adopted for the entire country.

A minimum wage of 25s (\$6.08) a week for all able-bodied men will henceforth rule in the municipal service in Glasgow, Scotland.

There is a well-defined plan to install women as drivers of the taxicabs and other power-driven vehicles on the streets of the largest cities of England.

MAJOR MERSEREAU  
IS SOME HUSTLER

(Chatham World.)

Major Mersereau supplements his insurance business by organizing syndicates and companies to carry on various kinds of business. He organized a black fox company, whose shares are held at a big premium. Then he bought a tract of land in St. John, right under the noses of land operators there, at \$400 an acre, where adjoining land is held at \$1000 an acre, and has formed a syndicate to take it over at a good advance on cost. Then, feeling the need of something else to do in this line and happening to hear of an idle wood-working factory in Moncton, he dropped in on the owner and got an option on it. Then he got experts from Amherst to appraise the land, building and machinery, and proceeded at once to get subscriptions to the stock of a company to take over the property and run the establishment. The company is getting the property at about half its appraised value, the location is a very desirable one and the prospect of carrying on a successful business is good. And now Mr. Mersereau is looking out for another opportunity. Why not organize a company to build car works in Chatham or take over the Muramichi pulp mill?



