## SCOTT ACT MATTERS AIRED BEFORE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

that effect and Fox told him to send back \$25. He did so. What else could he do?

Mr. Wetmore—"Why did you tell me that Col. Marsh had overlooked that fine?"

Mr. McFarlane—"I did not. What you refer to was another case that occurred some time before."

TELLS HOW TO DO IT?

Continuing, Mr. McFarlane stated that he was a lucky man to get clear of the Scott Act business in a clean manner. The councillors did not know what an inspector had to endure.

In reply to a query as to how liquor-selling could be stopped, Mr. McFarlane said that if the councillors would honestly say they wanted the traffic stopped it would be stopped.

COUN. NEILL OBJECTS.

Coun. Neill stated that Mr. McFarlane had every opportunity to put the liquor traffic out of business while in office.

Mr. McFarlane stated that twice the amount of liquor was being sold in York County today than there was two years ago.

Coun. McMullin stated he never had heard of Coun. Wetmore being after the inspectorship.

Coun. Sterling stated that as Mr. McFarlane had not brought a case against Mr. Fox and as he had paid a sum of money back to him the matter was cleared up and could be dropped forever. He moved to that effect.

Coun. Essensa pointed out that Mr. McFarlane had been paid expenses in connection with the removal of liquor and with other matters.

In reply to Coun. Hugh Smith Mr. McFarlane stated that the money he received from Fox was not a fine as a case had not been brought and on that account could not be paid to the magistrate. He had nothing else to do but wait for enough to make a fine but it never came.

With regard to his statement that the county had not paid his bill for the case before the county court Mr. McFarlane stated that the meaning he had intended to convey was that fifty dollars yet remained unpaid.

Coun. Sterling's motion with regard to the explanation was passed.

MORNING SESSION

The County Council met this morning and transacted a considerable amount of business. Judge Wilson of the York County Court appeared before the council and made a strong address advocating that labor or exercise of some kind for jail prisoners. The council also placed itself on record as being in favor of the restoration of the government House here as the residence of the lieutenant-governor.

A petition for the re-establishment of the official residence of the lieutenant-governor at the building in this city formerly used as Government House was presented to the County Council for the signatures of the councillors.

On the motion of Coun. McMullin, seconded by Coun. Graham, it was decided that the members of the council board should sign the petition.

MEDAL QUESTION STOOD OVER

On the motion of Coun. Griffin, seconded by Coun. McMullin, consideration of the matter of presenting medals for competition at the Provincial Normal School, was laid over until the July session.

JUSTICE REPORT

Coun. McMullin presented the report of the Administration of Justice Committee which was adopted. The expenses for the year was \$4,314.83, of which the City of Fredericton pays one third.

BY-LAW FOR MANNERS-SUTTON.

Coun. Hunter asked if there was any by-law compelling the use of a "shift" on a single sleigh or sled. If such did not exist it should be passed. In the Parish of Manners-Sutton "shifts" were not used and the result was that the winter roads were very poor.

On his motion a by-law was passed compelling the use of a "shift" on all single sleighs and sleds used in the Parish of Manners-Sutton.

Coun. McMullin moved a resolution to the effect that 33 Vic. Cap. 6 entitled "An Act to relieve Railway from Taxation" should be repealed, that railway property should be placed upon the same basis as other property, further that other municipalities be urged to adopt similar resolutions.

Coun. Everett seconded the resolution.

Coun. Hunter spoke strongly in support of the resolution. In his own parish of Manners-Sutton there was considerable railway property which he for some time had thought should be taxed as was any property. The C.P.R. always took pains to exact whatever it could from the

public.

Coun. Essensa also supported the resolution thinking that railways should be taxed.

To Coun. Stone the secretary-treasurer said that at present railways did not pay taxes on all their real estate that concerned with the running of trains being exempt under the statute mentioned.

The motion of Coun. McMullin was carried.

JUDGE WILSON HEARD.

Judge Wilson of the County Court, appeared before the council and made an explanation concerning his instruction to Jailer Timmins to give Harry Shortt, a prisoner confined in the county jail, kind treatment and more nourishing food than bread and water. He had done that at the representation of Very Rev. Dean Schofield. The young man had taken advantage of the kind treatment and had escaped.

The Judge stated that he had become aware that the council had discussed that matter. He could say to its members that he had felt that on the representations made to him he had acted properly in the matter. Some years ago a woman from the City of Fredericton had been sent up for trial on a serious offence. She had remained in jail from June to January and he had ordered she be given other food besides bread and water for it was pretty severe treatment.

Continuing he pointed out that everywhere the manner of dealing with prisoners was to the purpose of reforming them and not to place upon them the stamp of jail or penitentiary. Judge Wilson urged that steps be taken to provide labor for the prisoners in the jail.

Coun. Walker moved a resolution urging that the Administration of Justice Committee be continued and that that committee be instructed to promote legislation for more equitable division of the payment for the cost of administration of justice between city and county, the present basis being one third paid by the city and two-thirds by the county. Carried.

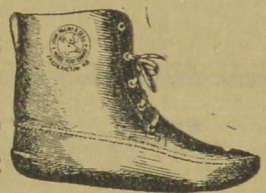
