MUNICIPALITIES UNION ENDORSED BY COUNCIL

A Motion to That Effect by Coun. McMullin Was Adopted—Coun. Graham Offers Some Criticism—Thinks the County Has Received no Return for the Outlay

The County Council Thursday afternoon although opposition was manifested on certain quarters voted that the Municipality of York should remain a member of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities and that the expenses of the delegates to meetings of the Union be paid. The recommendation of the Public Accounts Committee that certain accounts be paid was received and adopted.

The council decided also by a close vote to reconsider the proposition to present a gold and silver medal for competition at the Provincial Normal School. On Wednesday the proposition was defeated by a small majority.

UNION OF MUNICIPALITIES

Coun. McMullin moved that the Municipality of York remain a member of the Union of Municipalities and that the delegates receive remuneration.

Speaking in support of his motion Coun. McMullin said he felt strongly on the subject. There was nothing that the counties of New Brunswick could not do if they act in a body (Applause.) Where was that body if not the Union of Municipalities? He had not been born in the union, but still he recognized its advantages sufficiently to make the motion he had. If the council could not see fit to pay the expenses of the delegates he hoped the county would remain a member of the Union and send representatives to the meetings at their own expense.

COUN. GRAHAM OPPOSES

Coun. Graham stated that three years ago he had come into the council opposed to the Union of Municipalities. He had not changed his opinion. His colleague Coun. McMullin favored it strongly. He had every respect for Coun. McMullin, but that was no reason why he should agree with him. Since its organization the Union of Municipalities had cost York County a large sum of money. He failed to see the adequate return for that expenditure. Coun. Sterling had stated that it was through the efforts of the Union that an export-duty had been placed upon pulp-wood. If that were the case it was a benefit but he did not agree that it was through the Union that that result had been secured. He would like to hear other opinion.

Coun. Harry Smith expressed the opinion that united action by the municipalities would be more effective than individual effort. As a member of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association he had learned personally what a strong organization could accomplish for its individual members.

The motion of Coun. McMullin was carried.

THE MEDALS AGAIN

On the motion of Coun. Merrithew the matter of presenting gold and silver medals to the Provincial Normal School was reconsidered.

A vote was taken and was recorded as follows:—

Yea—Thompson, Hunter, Walker, Pickard, Morrison, Merrithew, Harry Smith, Neill, Cowperthwaite, Criffin, Clarence Noble, Greene, Skene, Sterling, Fawcett—15.

Nay—Stairs, Gilman, Murray, Essensa, Everett, Graham, J. H. Noble, Sloan, Morris, Veysy, Clark, Hugh Smith, Grant—12.

Coun. Sterling moved that the medals be presented to the Normal School for competition.

Coun. Graham thought the council was pretty easy. Every grant asked for had been given except this. The motion for it had been defeated but there was a determined effort to get that money. If the councillors were going to look after the interests of the taxpayers they had better begin.

Coun. Essensa desired to explain why he voted in the negative. The granting of such a medal was practically an encouragement to desert the farms. The people in the country did not have the educational facilities which would warrant putting their children in unfair competition with children of the towns.

Coun. Stairs expressed a similar opinion with regard to unfair competition.

On the amendment of Coun. Everett the matter was laid over until tomorrow.

The report of the Scott Act Committee being made the first item of business for the morning the council adjourned till 10 a. m. Friday.

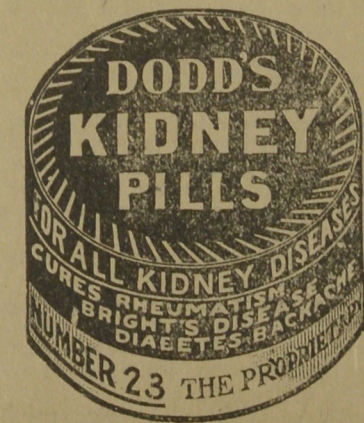
The court stipulated that the \$500 should be used for the benefit of the eight-year-old son of Holden.

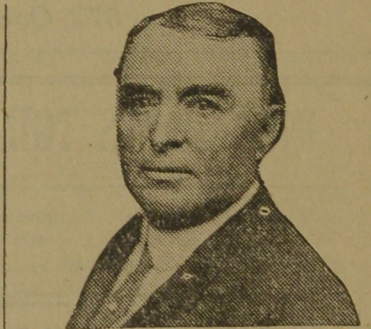
