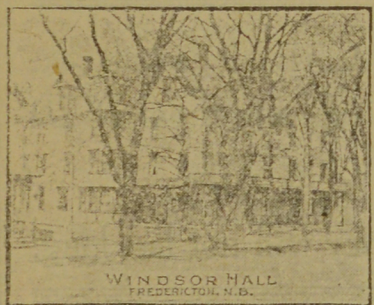

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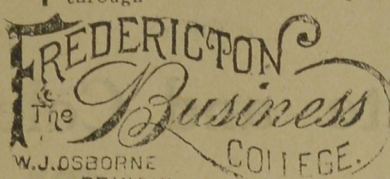

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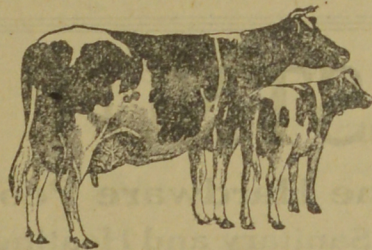

WOULD HAVE A TIME
LIKE A ROUGH SEA

Much amusement was caused at
Bow Street, London, when an Egyptian,
named Hadji Mahomed, was
accused of telling fortunes at prem-
ises in Lxford Street.

Mahomed, who wore a red tur-
ban, described himself as "the old
original Egyptian clairvoyant, crystal-
gazer, sand-diviner and palmist.
Under Royal patronage." At fre-
quent intervals he salamated pro-
foundly to the Magistrate.

Mrs. Annie Betts, who paid \$5 for
the experience, said she was told by
Mahomed:

"You will have a time like a rough
sea, going here, there and every-
where; husband and children; all
right one minute, smashing up every-
thing the next; everything better
next year; death, legacy.

"You go abroad with mother and
two children; plenty of love; ser-
vants to wait upon you; plenty of
money; in five years go back to Eng-
land, and show yourself to your
friends with three children.

"Husband going to die this year;
marry second husband next year;
start a fresh life; everything happy
and bright; live to be eighty-five."

"Crystal-gazing has been going on
for thousands of years," said Ma-
homed, "People come to me when
they are in trouble and I tell them
things to make them merry and
bright."

He was ordered to pay \$125 and
costs, in default of distress, three
months' imprisonment.

On hearing the Magistrate's deci-
sion he gave a violent start, and his
turban nearly fell off. He was shout-
ing "No goods, no goods; nor a
penny," when he was led towards the
cell passage.

FAMOUS RELIGIOUS EDITOR.

The famed Bible defender, the ven-
erable Pastor Russell of London and
Brooklyn Tabernacles, has won un-
stinted praise from the press and pub-
lic of many nations by forty years'
unceasing activity as evangelist and
writer.

In the early part of his ministry
smaller cities were frequently visited,
but not so now, since his field of
operation has become world-wide,
and the urgent invitations to deliver
free public lectures in the largest
cities have become so numerous that
even all of these cannot be accepted.

For the past several years Pastor
Russell has made semi-annual foreign
tours, and, through the press reports
of his meetings held in large public
halls of the leading cities, he has
received much favorable comment
and publicity.

Wonderful Drawing Power.

As a public speaker on Bible topics,
Pastor Russell stands unrivaled—
stands alone in a place created by
his own individual work, a place not
previously attained nor occupied by
another.

The mammoth crowds that repeat-
edly assemble to hear him at every
opportunity is conclusive evidence
as to his drawing power. Last year,
while conducting a series of Sunday
meetings in the London Royal Albert
Hall, Pastor Russell received written
communications through the mail
from more than six thousand persons,
requesting printed copies of his ser-
mons. So spontaneous a demand was

Another evidence of his popularity
on the other side of the rolling blue

dred papers in England, Ireland,

to-heart talk he gave his readers. He

"It is not the non-church-going
tendencies of the Age that I want to
talk to you about, although my
'theme' is more or less closely con-
nected with that subject. You have
all, I think, heard of Pastor Russell,
the wonderful American preacher, who
has just been inducted to the charge
of the London Tabernacle, known all
over the United Kingdom and thou-
sands of miles beyond, as the pulpit of
the revered Spurgeon. Mr. Russell
has achieved a position in the world
of religious thought unequalled by any
living Divine. And, curiously enough,
he delivers his message to far more
people 'outside' the church than could
ever be brought together within the
walls of the largest temple in the
Universe. His sermons and writings
have won for themselves an extraor-
dinary popularity in America and I
am credibly informed that Pastor
Russell's printed books on religious
subjects are excelled in circulation
only by the Bible itself. Just think
what this means. It means that mil-
lions of people all over the world
have found something in Pastor Rus-
sell's sermons, essays and lectures
which they have been unable to dis-
cover in any other religious writings
apart from the Great Book itself.

A Weekly Talk.

"Now to come to the crux of the
matter. I feel sure that the vast
majority of my readers will learn with
pleasure that I have arranged for a
weekly contribution from the pen of
Pastor Russell. A 'sermonette' Mr.
Russell himself calls it, but I have
an idea it will be found to be some-
thing more, something fuller, than
merely a condensed sermon. I have
been reading a selection of the famous
Pastor's religious writings, and they
appeal to me as being more of the
nature of quiet, discursive talks on
serious subjects than sermons of pul-
pit deliverances of the conventional
description. Pastor Russell is a clear,
easily understood thinker; he eschews
dogma and all subtleties of form and
faith, and he says what he has to say
on the great truths of religion and
morals in plain but always beautiful
language. He speaks and writes not
only to the ordinary church-goer, as
we accept the phrase, but to all in-
telligent men and women, and I for
one can quite well appreciate the
unparalleled popularity which he has
achieved in America—a popularity, I
feel convinced, he will very soon equal
in this country. Pastor Russell's talks
will begin in the Journal next week,
and I am hopeful that they will be
an extremely popular feature of the
Journal.

The Press of America.

Pastor Russell's popularity abroad
does not deprive him of the honor of
preaching to the largest congregation
in America. Surprising as it may
seem, his sermons are at present pub-
lished in more than one thousand
newspapers in America reaching ap-
proximately ten million homes week-
ly. Last June and July, while mak-
ing a trans-continental tour to attend
the Bible Students Convention at San
Francisco, Pastor Russell made sever-
al stops en route, and the reception
everywhere accorded the "American
Spurgeon" was most heart-cheering.

Many excellent accounts of his
meetings were published. "The San
Francisco Call," in making reference
to what other papers were saying, in-
terestingly summarized as follows:
"Pastor Russell's given name has
been lost to public record during the
last ten years, in which he has been
famous as the great 'Pastor'—plain
Pastor Russell—who has swayed hun-
dreds of thousands in this country
and abroad.

"Do they come to hear him? Well,
rather! So far it has been impossible
to engage a hall large enough to hold
the crowds. Dreamland Kink has been
hired for this occasion. In Kansas
City, Denver, Salt Lake and Los An-
geles the Pastor and his faithful crew
have taken the populace by storm.
The newspapers have given him more
space than a war eagle and print his
speeches like a Presidential message."

VIRTUAL FREE TRADE
IN PULP AND PAPER

Montreal, Jan. 5—The action of
Sir Lomer Gouin in modifying the
regulations regarding the export of
pulpwood cut from crown lands is
arousing unusual interest and com-
ments and criticisms of both a fa-
vorable and an unfavorable nature
are being heard.

On the part of those who have had
the restrictions removed there is the
greatest satisfaction, as it means
that they will be better able to com-
pete with other Canadian and Ameri-
can papermakers than was the case
formerly. Previously those few man-
ufacturers of papers affected by the
new regulations cut their wood from
crown lands and as a result their
product was subject to a duty of
\$5.75 per ton entering the United
States. This made it hard for them
to compete with Canadian paper
manufacturers who cut their supplies
from free lands, as paper made from
wood cut on free lands went in duty
free. The mills affected manufacture
480 tons of news per day and fifty
of kraft.

VIRTUALLY FREE TRADE.

Again, it is claimed that this ac-
tion will stimulate the production of
paper in this province, as it will be
only a short time before the same
concessions now granted to the four
or five large mills will be extended
to all the mills, and there will be
virtually free trade in pulp and paper
between this province and the United
States. At present the United States
duty on paper made from wood cut
on crown lands is \$5.75 per ton,
which is a somewhat serious barrier
to be overcome before Canadian man-
ufacturers can compete with Ameri-
can manufacturers of paper.

BREACH IN PROTECTIVE WALL.

In criticism of Sir Lomer's latest
move it is pointed out that it is a
backward step and that it is virtu-
ally a breach in the protective wall he
raised in 1910 around the paper and
pulp industry in this province. Two
years ago, when his regulation pro-
hibiting the export of pulpwood cut
from crown lands went into force,
business men were given to under-
stand that the policy would be per-
manent. As a matter of fact, it
proved a wonderful stimulus to the
pulp and paper industry and during
the year following its inauguration
no fewer than nineteen pulp, paper
and lumber companies, with a total
capitalization of \$41,709,000, were

incorporated in this province. Dur-
ing 1912 the incorporations were
fewer, but a number of new mills
incorporated the year before began
to manufacture, with the result that
the output of paper is now nearly
five hundred tons per day greater
than it was a year ago.

Doubtless the old established paper
companies, such as the Laurentide,
Belgo-Canadian, etc., are feeling the
competition of new mills, as well as
the handicap of a duty of \$5.75 per
ton on all paper sent to the United
States. It is known that these paper
companies had the active assistance
of the American Publishers' Associa-
tion in their movement to have the
embargo removed. Several weeks
ago John Norris, head of the Ameri-
can Publishers' Association, joined
with the representatives of several
Canadian companies and waited on
Sir Lomer Gouin and his cabinet.
That their visit was not in vain is
shown by the present order in coun-
cil.

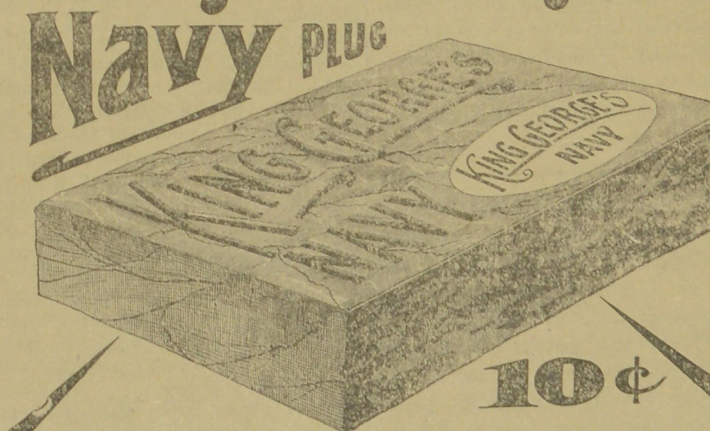
WOULD STIMULATE INDUSTRY.

It is generally believed that this
is the beginning of the end of the
provincial protection of our forests,
and that in a short time all restric-
tions will be removed and our paper
will enter the United States duty
free. Such an action would not en-
danger the industry to any extent.
It is well known that paper can be
manufactured in this province for
\$5.50 per ton less than it costs to
manufacture it in the United States.
This is due to the fact that Quebec
possesses the water power, the raw
pulpwood and sufficient labor to give
her tremendous advantage over Ameri-
can manufacturers. In addition,
most of the Canadian mills are mod-
ern and are equipped with the very
latest and best machinery. These
advantages are sufficient to make the
Province of Quebec the greatest
paper-making centre on the contin-
ent. If all her paper could enter the
United States duty free it would give
an additional stimulus to the indus-
try. That this will likely come to
pass is almost an assured fact.
