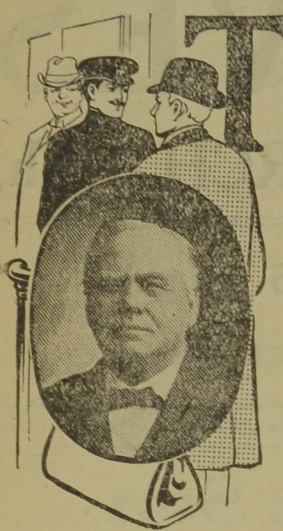

dagranly insulting the dignity of parliament!" But Red Michael would not sit down. He kept sweeping on like a cavalry charge.

"Name us all!" The whole opposition was on its feet. Mr. Speaker blanched. So did the government benches. The thing was going farther than they expected. But Mr. Speaker was in it up to his neck and could not draw out. So he launched his bolt.

Strangely enough Red Michael did not curl up and die. Having said his say he sat down and smiled.

Observe now how the dead game sports played the game! Red Michael's contempt should have been reported, the House should have suspended him and, if he still refused to retract he should have been removed by the police by force of arms.

But Red Michael carried out by the police meant that the whole British-born vote carried out with him. So milder counsels prevailed and Premier Borden, buttering his words, suggested that Dr. Clark explain that he meant no offence to Mr. Speaker. Which Dr. Clark did handsomely. It was noticeable that nothing was said to Verville, who had been shouting: "Free speech, I won't stand for this!" Verville was not named. Mr. Speaker was taking no chances with the labor vote. Cautious—oh yes!

TORY FLAG-FLAPPERS GIVEN A JOLT

But Chairman Blain's mild Bible-class mood didn't carry him far. In the din of Red Michael's battle some booby patriot on the government side had yelled "rebels." That was a little matter that had to be attended to, so along comes Martin of Regina trailing the tail of his coat. His eyes flashing, his face anger-white, Martin said: "The Tories are the rebels. Chairman Blain asked that it be drawn. Martin explained that it was the Tories of seventy years ago he was calling rebels. That seemed reasonable enough. Martin went on to speak of gag rule. WARRANTS ISSUED IN HOCHELAGA SCANDAL

Montreal, March 20—The Hochelaga scandal, which the Government declined to investigate, will now be aired in the criminal courts. At six o'clock Wednesday night Judge Husmer Lanctot issued warrants against Elie Lalumiere and Emil Bourassa, who both signed the affidavits and the counter-affidavits laid before Parliament last Monday.

The complainant is Edmond Lepage, Real Estate Broker, who was chief organizer for Mr. Leclerc Dajon, the candidate who ran against Hon. Coderre, in the Hochelaga bye-election. He accuses Lalumiere and Bourassa of having attempted to extort certain sums of money and a position in the Canadian Civil Service from and through the influence of Hon. Lewis Coderre and his electoral organizers, Joseph Angrignon and Joseph Major, by accusing and threatening to accuse the three named gentlemen of having been guilty of fraudulent electoral practices.

this was the first of a series of charges he would lay against these individuals, whom the Minister of Justice described on the floor of the House as "admitted personators, blackmailers and perjurers."

The warrants have been handed to High Constable St. Mars, who immediately instructed two of his men to search for Lalumiere and Bourassa. The latter, though believed to be still in Montreal, is not likely to be found, and for the past two weeks his whereabouts are not known. As to Mr. Lalumiere, the last heard from him was from New York, when he wrote that he was sailing for Europe. But the belief is that he is wandering somewhere in the New England States. The charges are laid under article 434 of the Criminal Code, which makes the offender liable to an imprisonment of seven years.
