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EASTER

The wonderful story of the resurrection of Christ never does and never can grow old. Repetition and criticism cannot destroy or weaken its perennial appeal to the human heart. We are of another race and have nothing in common with those who listened to the wondrous words "He is Risen," in the grey dawn of the Syrian morn two thousand years ago, but we respond to the message with an eagerness and faith the intervening centuries have utterly failed to weaken or disprove. It is an old story, yet always new. It is one of the choicest treasures belonging to the human race. The mystery of it, the problems it suggests, none of these things can move away the heart of man from an instinctive return to its faith in the master story. The spontaneous response to the Easter appeal breaks all the arguments and dogmas of the cavilling unbelievers, and all mankind glories over the great victory which life achieved over death. It has caused man to believe himself immortal; he feels that he was not made to die, and the love by which he lives mocks at the omnipotence of death. That love never has and never will brook defeat.

Throughout the Christian world tomorrow the story of the glorious resurrection of our blessed Saviour will be told over again and more hearts will feel its strange thrill than ever before. The glorious words "He is Risen" will be on every tongue, and the hope that centred around the lone grave two thousand years ago will be rekindled. We have left behind much of the creed of the race's childhood, but mankind will ever cling to the priceless possession it holds in the message and meaning of the Easter story.

Discussing the new highway act the Newcastle Advocate (Tory) says:

"In one respect the new road bill will cause some little surprise. Prior to 1908 the members of the present Government were always clamoring for the roads to be taken out of politics and placed in control of the people, and the first piece of highway legislation was based on this principle. Now they have gone right back on their previous record and in leaving the nomination of road officials in the hands of the members of the Legislature have brought the roads more into politics than ever. As if the curse of pull, patronage and politics isn't bad enough as it is!"

During the session of the Legislature just closed Premier Flemming had \$2400 added to his salary, while that eminent authority on Agriculture, Hon. Dr. Landry, had his increased by \$400. Under the provisions of the act relating to the provincial Hospital, which went through the House without a dissenting voice, the Municipalities of the province had their taxes increased by \$17,000.

During the session of the Legislature just closed discussion on questions of public importance was limited to the caucus room. Now that the House has prorogued the Governor-in-Council will get busy and do the legislating which should have been done by the House. Under Flemming rule we seem to be gradually drifting away from the principles of responsible government.

A Woodstock Tory paper refers to the new highway act as a popular measure. Tory newspapers said the same thing about the highway act which has just been wiped off the statute books by the very men who created it. From the view point of the subsidised Tory press anything is popular which emanates from the Flemming government.

In introducing the new Highway Act, Chief Commissioner Morrissey, who in future is to be known as the Minister of Public Works, made the statement that under the old act \$30,000 of the public money never found its way to the roads. What he probably meant by this was that the money went to pay the army of officials. Under the new act officials will get larger salaries.

Mr. O. S. Crocket, M. P., who is home for Easter, does not appear to have cut much of a figure in the stormy debate at Ottawa last week. He was probably thinking of that judgship, which he is not going to get.

Hon. James McMullin a member of the Canadian senate died at his home at Mount Forest, Ont., on Tuesday. He was a member of the old guard of Liberalism and sat in the House of Commons for North Wellington from 1882 until 1901. In the latter year he was called to the senate.

The local government has passed an act making provision for the destruction of liquor shipped into prohibited districts. One may assume from this that heretofore liquor shipped into prohibition districts escaped destruction. That may be true if some places but it will scarcely apply to Fredericton.

The new city council when they get settled down to business should give careful attention to the question of opening up new streets. There is likely to be quite a building boom in Fredericton during the coming summer, and building lots will be in demand.

The secret of Mr. Pinder's silence in the House during the present session is out. On Thursday Premier Flemming put through a bill increasing the bond guarantee on the Southamptton Railway from \$10,000 to \$12,000 per mile.

Why was the Secretary of the Board of Public Works paid \$150 in addition to his salary and expenses for attending the Birmingham investigation in Carleton County. Why was an effort made to cover the matter up?

The absence of an effective opposition during the recent session of the Legislature did not permit of much of an opportunity to talk to the galleries. This must have been disappointing to Hon. Mr. McLeod and the other gallery performers.

Instead of having a Legislature composed of the worst element of one political party it would certainly be more in the interests of the province to have one composed of the best element of both parties.

The Hazen Highway Act, which was to place the control of the roads in the hands of the people, seems to have had its tail cut off close behind its ears.

Having got his salary boosted during the recent session of the Legislature there is no further talk of Premier Flemming retiring from provincial politics.

The Liberals in Parliament assisted in putting through five million dollars of estimates on Wednesday. This does not look like obstructing the public business.

DOUBLE FATALITY ON VALLEY ROAD

Woodstock, N. B., March 19—A horrible fatality happened this afternoon about six miles from town, on the works of Scott & Kelly, contractors on the Valley Railway.

Two Italians, Angelo Spagnotti and Romola Ronaldo, were engaged in blowing, with dynamite, the frozen mud in a cut, when a terrific explosion occurred and the two unfortunate men were literally blown to pieces, portions of their bodies being found 200 yards from the scene of the accident. The heads of both men were blown off and frightfully mangled.

As they were alone, it is difficult to account for the accident, but it is the opinion that a tin containing a lot of dynamite, in which it was being thawed, upset into the fire.

Chief of Police Kelly and Coroner Lindsay were notified and went at once to the scene of the accident. A jury was empanelled and an inquest will be held tomorrow. The victims were both young, being 21 and 22 years of age respectively.

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
