



WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE—A Women's
Suffrage petition is being industriously
circulated in the vicinity of the
city and being industriously signed.

AT HOME—Lady Tilley's At Home
to be given Thursday evening, 24th
inst., will be held at Government
House and not at the Governor's private
residence.

ORDERED OUT—Three years had
looking specimens of real were order-
ed to be taken out of the market by
the Health Inspector Wednesday
morning and the order was obeyed.

RESUMED WORK—Edgecombe &
Son's carriage factory resumed op-
erations on Tuesday after suspension
of seven weeks. The matters in dis-
pute between the heirs have been
amicably arranged.

A NEW ONE—John H. Reid, the
veteran horseman, besides the four
fine equines in his stable, is to se-
cure another in a short time. He has
a record of 2:15 and is a good one,
so John says, and he knows.

TEMPERANCE—The Gospel Tem-
perance meeting last Sunday evening
was addressed by Messrs. Hanning-
ton, Burchill and Powell. There was
a large attendance and the ad-
dresses were highly appreciated.

VISITORS IN TOWN—Hon. David
McLellan, registrar of deeds for St.
John; Hon. Peter Mitchell, Robert
Cruikshank of St. John, and W. C.
Milner of Sackville, arrived here dur-

FAILED—The secretary of the Ohio
One Year Beneficiary Society has
received notice that the society has
failed with liabilities of \$60,000. The

more calls to pay when their terms
were up and their certificates matur-
ed. There is deep mourning.

VACANT JUDGESHIP—The vacant
judgeship is the principal topic of
discussion at present, especially
among Conservatives. The candida-
tes mentioned are Dr. F. E. Barker,
Mr. D. L. Hannington, Mr. C. N.
Skinner and Mr. R. A. Lawlor. Some
suggest Mr. L. A. Curry and back up
his appointment by saying that he
has worked very hard for the party.
Judge Landry is also spoken of but
he has a strong opponent in Mr.
Burns. (Mr. Hannington subsequent-
ly received the appointment.)

THE SCOTT ACT—A topic that is
exciting considerable talk is as to
outcome of the motion by the coun-
cil at their last session respecting
the Scott Act. All think that the
act should be either enforced or re-
pealed. There will probably be a
heated discussion at the next meet-
ing and several new points will be
introduced respecting the collection
of fines.



to 20th next.




