**HIGH SCHOOL

High School beat St. Dunstan's 7 to 6, in five innings of rocky ball and the league executive will have a protest on its hands at tonight's meeting if St. Dunstan's makes good its threat. The ground for protest was the declaring out by Umpire Phillips of McDonald the St. Dunstan's short-stop, who in the fifth and last inning hit the ball over the left-field fence for a home-run. According to Umpire Bob Phillips, who was on the bases McDonald neglected to go through the formality of touching second base while making the circuit and for that was put out. Had his run counted the score would have been tied. Just before this incident McDonald clouted the ball over the left-field fence for a foul.

The diamond at Scully's Grove was being overhauled preparatory to the season's games in the N. B.—Maine League and the local league game was played at the College Field. The diamond was not properly laid off and the baselines were very indefinite. The ground was rough and everything combined to produce poor baseball. Heavy hitting was a feature of the game. The infielders were handicapped but the outfielders did some good work. A difficult catch by Edgecombe brought applause from the fans.

In San Francisco and Calgary this week will be held contests between some of the leading white hopes. Gunboat Smith and Jess Willard battle against each other at San Francisco tomorrow night and Luther McCarty and Arthur Pelky of Chicopee, will clash at Calgary on Saturday. It was in that city in the winter of 1910 that McCarty first tried his hand at boxing.

It looks like a joke to the local sports to hear about Pelky meeting such a boxer as McCarty, for when the former showed at the Old Armory A. A. he displayed no class. However, Pelky has developed into a clever man, it is said, and has a good chance of winning.

The Chicopee boxer has been given a good schooling by Tommy Burns, ex-world's champion, as well as by a former amateur heavyweight champion. Strange things have happened in the boxing game but it will be a big surprise to the local sports if Pelky gets the award.

Despite the boosting that Gunboat Smith has been getting, close followers of the game are picking Willard to defeat him. Some say Smith is not the gamest fellow in the sport. Willard will have a big advantage in reach, height and cleverness. It is figured, too, that he has just as hard a wallop as Smith.

INSHOOT CURVE  
PASSES AWAY**

Edward Nolan First Pitched That Curve  
Twenty-Five Years Ago—Thought  
Optical Illusion

New York, May 18—Sergt Edward Nolan of the Paterson, N. J., police force, a well known ball pitcher in the days of "King" Kelly, "Pop" Anson and Dan Brouthers, died at his home there today after a day's illness. After the Brotherhood collapsed Nolan, who was known as "Only" Nolan, joined the force. It is said he was the first man to throw an inshoot curve, a feat, which 25 years ago the scientific American doubted, claiming any such performance was an optical illusion.

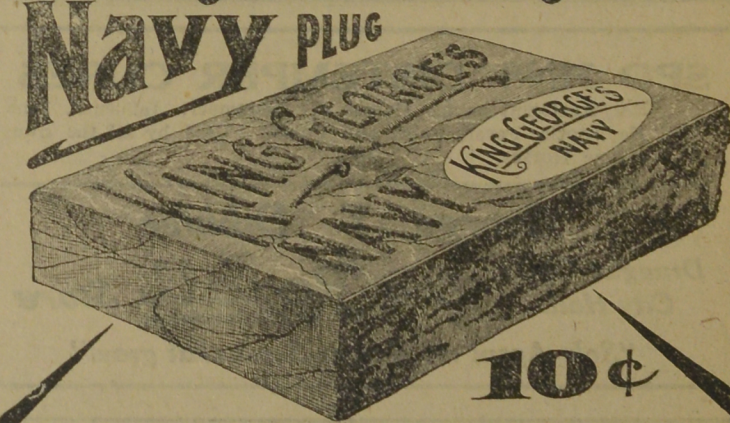
