BORDEN'S MAKESHIFT POLICY

(Continued from page 5)

naval service law of 1910, which created a Canadian navy, is a separatist law and that our aims are towards separation. In connection with this I have a word to say to my hon. friend the minister of labor. Some days ago the hon. minister delivered a speech in this House, in which he said, speaking of the election of Drummond and Arthabaska, that, although I have for more than forty years been in the constituency, I had taken no part in that election because my friends, who were supporting the Liberal cause, were preaching separation and that if I had been there I would have had to bear amongst the English provinces the odium of the doctrine which was being preached in Drummond and Arthabaska. In order to do justice to the hon. the minister of labor, I will quote the very words he made use of. Speaking of the election, he said:

He did not appear amongst the people once during that campaign in Drummond and Arthabaska. Why? His followers carried forward that campaign and the burden of their song on every platform on which they spoke throughout the constituency was that the naval policy of the then government meant separation, and had been adopted with a view to putting the people of Canada in a position to take care of themselves as soon as they became independent. That was the burden preached from every platform in Drummond and Arthabaska during the first election held after the naval bill was introduced and carried in this House in 1910. Any hon. gentleman who desires to verify my remarks may do so by referring to the columns of The Montreal Herald and The Montreal Witness, both Liberal papers, where they will find, in the report of the meetings held throughout Drummond and Arthabaska, that the government of that day was preaching Canadian independence, and the right hon. leader of the opposition, not desiring to incur in the English-speaking provinces the odium of supporting that doctrine, and not desiring to go into the constituency and say anything that would not be popular with the people, kept out of it altogether. What do hon. gentlemen think of a prime minister who, having introduced such a measure as the naval bill of 1910, and the first election after the passage of his bill taking place in the constituency in which he lived for forty years, plays the coward and keeps out of the constituency altogether.

CROTHERS' SCORED.

Sir, there are big words in that paragraph. The word 'coward' is a big one, even in the mouth of my hon. friend the minister of labor, who is not, he will admit, accustomed to remarkable feats of bravery. The hon. gentleman and I are good friends, I hope, but I am sure he will not take it amiss if I suggest that when he selects his adjectives, he had better consult the record in order to ascertain whether or not they fit in with the subject. He gave very good advice to his hearers on that occasion when he suggested that they read the Montreal Witness and the Montreal Herald, both Liberal papers. If he had himself followed the advice he gave to others, if he had read the Montreal Witness, the Montreal Herald, the Montreal Gazette or the Montreal Star, he would never have spoken as he did, for he would have known that I was in Drummond and Arthabaska, and that I held the first meeting with my hon. friend the then Solicitor General, the member for Three Rivers (Mr. Bureau) when the candidature of Mr. Perreault the Liberal candidate was being presented to the people. I attended that meeting, I spoke to perhaps one thousand electors, and I set forth the policy of the Government of the day. I affirm—and I challenge contradiction—that separation and disloyalty were preached

It is for this reason that, summarizing the position we have taken, we say we cannot support this policy. But my last word is that we cannot support it and I beg to move the six-months' hoist.

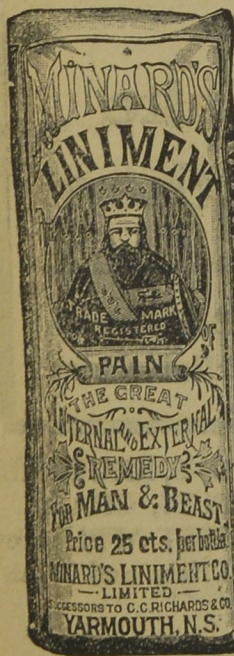
