COUNTY ELECTIONS
ARE CREATING
MORE INTEREST

Nominations Close on Monday Next
But Number of Candidates are
In Field---Number of Warm
Contests Will Occur

The biennial election of councillors to represent the various parishes of York County in the Municipal Council will take place Tuesday, September 2. Nominations close with the various parish clerks on Monday next, August 25, and will immediately be forwarded to the Secretary-Treasurer for the county. Already the political pot is boiling in various parishes and a number of candidates are reported to be in the field.

A number of ex-councillors are again appealing to the electorate. Ex-Couns. G. C. Grant in Canterbury, Ex-Coun. E. N. Reynolds in Bright, Ex-Coun. Patrick Graham in Southampton, Ex-Coun. Chas. W. Pond in Stanley, and Ex-Coun. Geo. Farrell in North Lake, are in the field. It is also rumored that Ex-Coun. Alex. Brewer and Ex-Coun. W. L. McFarlane are to be candidates in Douglas, and Ex-Coun. Clarence Goodspeed and Ex-Coun. Fred W. Pond in St. Mary's.

Several other candidates are said to be in the field. In North Lake Mr. C. Wetmore, son of Ex-Coun. T. Wetmore, is to be in the field according to report. Mr. J. W. Murray is to be a candidate in McAdam, Mr. Fred Flewelling is seeking election in Douglas, and Mr. Frank Saunders in Prince William.

It is expected that the great majority of the present councillors will again be candidates. No retirements have been announced definitely but it is rumored that Warden Alex. Skeen of McAdam, will retire from municipal politics.

TAX-PAYMENTS
BEGIN TO POUR INTO
TREASURER'S OFFICE

Period for Obtaining Discount Expires
on Thursday Next, August 21---
Heavy Receipts Expected Be-
fore That Date

The usual rush of citizens to the office of the City Treasurer in order to pay their taxes and take advantage of the discount of five per cent. allowed on payments made on or before August 21 has begun. On Saturday the first of the rush was noticed and today there has been a steady payment of taxes.

The usual arrangements for keeping the office of the City Treasurer open in the evenings of Thursday and probably other days will be made in order that the citizens will have ample opportunity to pay during the discount period.

Up to the present time the amount of taxes paid in has been about equal to that paid in at the same time previous years. The assessment this year is larger than ever before and as there appears to be a greater inclination to take advantage of the discount, it is possible that a record payment will be made by Thursday night.

A BEAR STORY.
