## Fredericton High Clinches Interscholastic Title

### PRESENT N. H. A. SEASON NOT FINANCIAL SUCCESS

#### Canadiens Paid big Salaries but Stand Better Chance Than Other Teams--Big Cut in Salaries Expected Next Season--Smaller Leagues Probably Will be Searched for Players

Financially speaking it is questionable whether the season of 1913 even with its occasional big gates has been a howling success with the National Hockey Association. Canadiens stand to finish the season better than the rest but it is very doubtful whether Canadiens will be very much on the right side by the time it is all over. At that it is to be remembered that things have broken well for the Frenchmen this year. It is the unsettled weather which ushered in the early portions of the season Canadiens almost invariably draw what fine nights there were.

Getting away to a good start and leading the league for virtually the first half of the season the following of the Flying Frenchmen supported their favorites royally. Right up to last Saturday when the record gate of the season paid admission at the Arena wealth seemed to flow in on the club.

Officials however, say "No". It is claimed for Canadiens that two players this season cost as much as the whole team two years ago—you are allowed two guesses at the players.

"But never again for us" said the member of the Canadian executive discussing the outlook. "We have paid the last princely salary to allow hockey players to live like retired millionaires. There'll be no more of it. Two players don't make a hockey team and the places of our two highest paid men might just as easily and effectively be filled by players we have carried on the bench.

WANDERERS STAND TO LOSE.

If Canadiens with their big gates have made no money it is a safe guess that Wanderers will be heavy losers on the season. Wanderers' form inconsistencies have robbed them of many supporters to say nothing of those hockey fans who follow the fortunes of the team because it is a winner and nothing else. Wanderers have carried a big string of high priced players most of the season. If they break even on the season it will be a wonder.

QUEBEC ALSO

Quebec with a champion team is reputed to have made no money, but rather to have lost it, and Quebec has only the ancient rink accommodation at the ancient capital to thank Quebec's team has been a high priced one—though it might have cost three thousand dollars more than it actually did cost if President Quinn had not refused to sanction the loan of Pibre to Quebec for a three thousand dollar salary and a tribute to the Canadian club every time the "Bullet" played. With an up-to-date rink, capable of seating five or six thousand people, Quebec might have stood a chance with the team they gathered together to make money. As things are, however, Quebec look to be due to do little more than break even.

All reports from Ottawa show that there will be a heavy deficit. Barring a couple of good gates earlier in the season the Senators have been playing before miserable attendances. A parsimonious policy seems to have

overtaken the Ottawa Club of late; it is even said that Ottawa players have to buy their own sticks if they want to get tools that will suit their individual tastes. At that Ottawa is not carrying an expensive team—but yet Ottawa looks to be due to lose money.

TORONTO TEAMS A PUZZLE

About the Toronto teams it is hard at this distance to judge with any accuracy. Reports sent out from Toronto of the attendances at the various games have been so conflicting in their nature that an estimate of the attendances at the new Arena is difficult to arrive at. Both Tecumseh and Toronto are reported to be fairly low-priced outfits and it is likely that they may about break even, but not much more.

The upshot of it all seems to indicate that next season will see a wholesale hacking in salaries. There have been on the market for the past few seasons a few players have commanded big figures on their reputation alone. Those reps are about as frizzled now as a soubrette's lingerie after a six months tour of one night stands—and will hardly fetch the value their owners set on them next season. There is, moreover, a school of younger players being developed—witness the young Toronto team for example—who will hasten the waning of some of the stars of the East. The hockey field in the past appears to have been bounded by such narrow limits that the clubs have not gone far afield except for players with already established reputations. But there must be players away in the bushes somewhere who can reach the N.H.A. Class with but little breaking in.

MADE GOOD.

Mummary and Crawford of this year's Quebec team are notable examples. Mummary and Crawford came east from Manitoba, unhonored and unsung. Nobody knew anything about them except Joe Hall. Joseph guessed they might supply the vacant places on the Quebec team caused by the raid of the Patricks and Joe guessed right. Both players made good in the company they were called on to play with and appear to be developing all the time.

It would be a matter for no wonder next season to see more importations into the N. H. A. circles of the Mummary-Crawford variety.

BERLANQUETTE AN IMPROVEMENT

Berlanquette of Canadiens is a player who has wonderfully improved this season. Two years ago he was a very ordinary spare with the Frenchmen. Last year he got seasoning in the Maritime League, and this season developed into a really useful player, when once a regular place on the team had been found for him.

### FRANK LEONARD TO MANAGE MARATHONS

F. J. Leonard, the owner of the Lynn Baseball team in the New England Baseball League arrived in the city yesterday and was selected by the owners of the Marathon Club to manage the Greeks for the coming season. He has also been engaged to organize the Maine and New Brunswick league for the 1913 season. Mr. Leonard's long experience in baseball matters places him in a position to handle matters in the proper manner. He will remain here for some time getting things into shape and in addition to the work of organizing a league, he will commence immediately in getting a Marathon team together for next season's playing.

Harry Gray, who developed Grace G. 2:05 1/2 and who last season raced the two Dan Patch mares, Pearl Patch, 2:06 1/2, and Princess Patch, 2:11 1/2, will open a public stable at Toledo.

### Beat Rothesay 8 to 3 Last Night--Game was Slow and Result Never in Doubt--Local School Has Not Lost a League Game

Fredericton High School captured the Interscholastic Hockey Championship for 1913 by trimming Rothesay Collegiate School 8 to 3 at the Arctic Rink last night. Fredericton High has won three games and lost none. It is not likely that the local team will play St. John High at St. John in the match which was postponed some days ago on account of mild weather but as the league stands at present Fredericton High's claim to the title cannot be disputed.

GAME NOT FAST

The game last night was not particularly fast neither team playing as well as they have before during the present season. Fredericton H. S. had the game well in hand at all stages and slowed up toward the end of the match. The local team was superior in practically all departments. The forwards worked in better combination and the defence checked harder. Both goal-keepers put up good hockey but VanWart was the better and had the further advantage of being afforded, good protection by his team-mates. Barbour's defence was a usual, strong. Dolan the Fredericton forwardpoint was more effective through his offensive work and scored twice. Flett and Edgecombe did the greater part of the forward work. For Rothesay Gilbert was the hardest working of the forwards and Coster who replaced Connell in the second half also showed up well, and was the only Rothesay player Hunter at cover point worked hard and was the only Rothesay player penalized. He got five minutes with the timers for cracking Coy over the head although he claimed the blow was accidental and it so looked from the side. On the wings the two teams were fairly evenly matched. Coy of Fredericton High displayed the vault off overskating the puck however. The game was clean and not rough. The penalties were light.

FIRST HALF

Fredericton showed early in the first half that they had the visitors' measure. Flett scored the first goal from a mixup near the Rothesay net. Coy tallied the second on a rush by the forwards. Flett made the third goal from a mixup. Fourth goal, on a nice clean shot. Edgecombe scored Fredericton's fourth goal on a nice clean shot. Starr scored the only goal made by Rothesay during the period. At the time two Fredericton players were on the ice.

SECOND HALF

Half time began with Rothesay working hard to score. In clearing his net VanWart swung at one of the attacking forwards and was sent off for it. Coy got away on a rush and shot but Walklate saved a goal only to have Edgecombe score on the rebound. Two minutes later Edgecombe repeated the performance. At this point Dolan was playing well back and trying long shots. One of them went in the net much to the surprise of himself and everybody else. From the following face-off Fredericton rushed and Dolan scored on a short shot. Rothesay then proceeded to back up and gave Fredericton High an interesting time although the score was so one-sided the result of the game never was in doubt. Payne went down the side and passed to centre-ice where Gilbert scored on a nice shot. In another minute Payne scored himself on a side shot. For the balance of the match Rothesay worked hard but failed to score. Both VanWart and Walklate made each some good stops.
