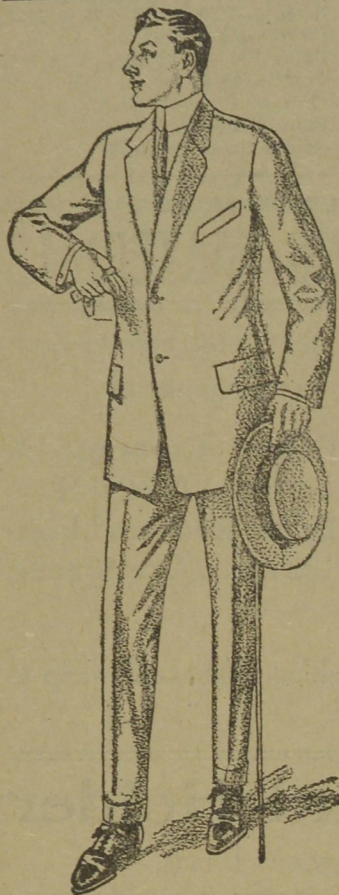

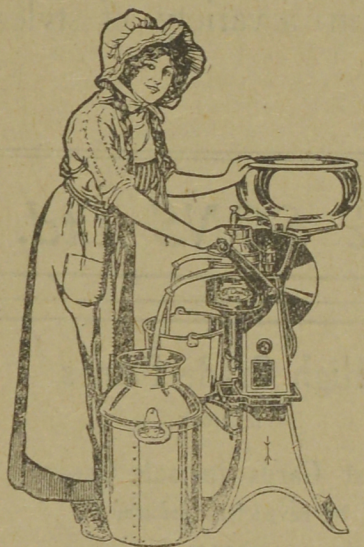

## HALIFAX FILLY ENTERED IN KENTUCKY FUTURITY AND OTHERS

Out of Karava by Baring—Full Sister  
To Baring's Comet—One of Best  
in Provinces

(Acadian Recorder)

W. H. Musgrave is the owner of another valuable and richly bred youngster, his great brood mare Karava by Kremlin, having on Wednesday given birth to a filly by Baring, 2.134, by Bingara, son of Bngen. This filly is thus a full sister to Baring's Comet, 2.284, the champion two-year-old of the Maritime Provinces of 1912, and a half sister to his Achilles the Great, 2.234, at three years, 2.204, at four years.

Mr. Musgrave has this filly entered in the Kentucky Futurity stake of \$21,000 at Lexington; the \$10,000 American Horse Breeder stake, and the \$5,000 stake at Brockton, Mass. Mr. Musgrave is to be congratulated on possessing such a fine filly, and it is hoped he will meet with deserved success in his enterprise in nominating this filly in the big stakes, which fact alone attracts attention abroad to the breeding interests of the Provinces.

## "HONUS" WAGNER HAS FIFTEEN YEAR RECORD

"Honus" Wagner has for the last sixteen years batted for better than 3,000, beating Anson's record of 15 consecutive years in the same class. Willie Keeler hit for 300 or better consecutively for thirteen years; Billy Hamilton for 12; Ed. Delehanty and Joe Kelley for 11 each, and Hugh Duffy, Jesse Burkett and Napoleon Lajoie for 10 each. Since Wagner joined the Louisville team in 1897 he has made 2827 hits, and oeds, therefore, only to get 173 more, which is fewer than he made last season, to make a record of 3000 hits since he began playing professional baseball.

## SOME FIELDERS' CHOICES TO BE SCORED AS HITS

Ban Johnson Issues Orders to American League  
Official Scorers—National League Takes Similar  
Action—Baseball Writers' Association Now Considering Case of the Sacrifice Bunt

Chicago, April 25—Hereafter American League batters will be credited with hits on certain plays hitherto scored as fielders' choices, according to a notice sent out by Pres. B. B. Johnson to official scorers in his organization. His letter in part follows:

"Official scorers of the American League are requested to credit the batsmen with hits in the following cases:

"When, with one or more runners on bases, the batsman reached first base on a play to retire the runner nearest to home plate, and no out results, provided that the play be made without error by an opponent.

"Example: With runners on first and second, the batsman hits to pitcher or infielder, who makes a perfect attempt to retire the runner going to third, but the runner beats the play and the batsman reaches first."

## IN THE NATIONAL

Sporting Life has the following note on the same subject:

Secretary Heydler, of the National League, has instructed his official scorers to score the "fielder's choice" play as a safe hit for the batsman in all cases; also to score earned runs, making the pitcher responsible for all runs scored on hits hit batsmen, bases on balls, balks, sacrifice hits, wild pitches and stolen bases.

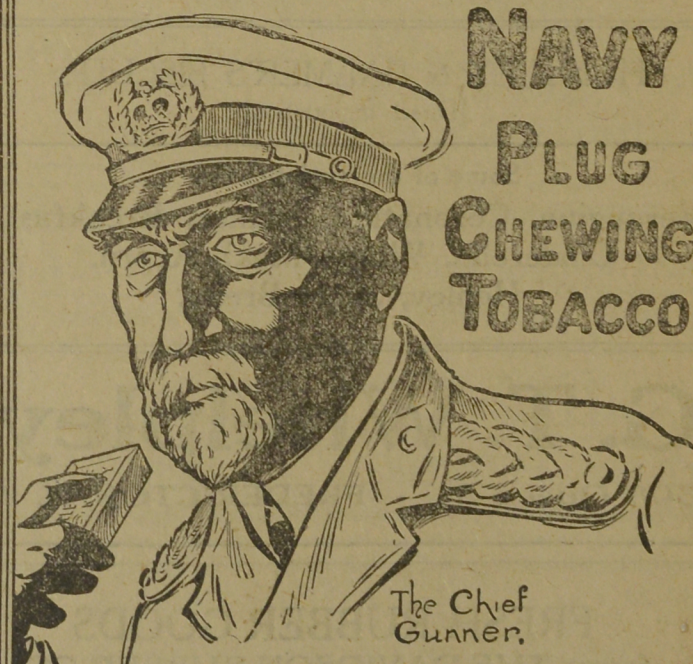
