OVER HALF MILLION IN CASH CREMATED

Montreal, March 1—Half a million of perfectly good money was burned in Toronto this week.

Mr. F. M. Garland, acting manager of Montreal Clearing House, returned today from Toronto, where he went to see the official "cremation" of \$511,000 in bills. He was acting for Mr. John Knight, manager of the local clearing house, who has been ill for two weeks and who was unable to go to Toronto for the money burning.

The money was in Traders' Bank bills, which are being done away with, for since the amalgamation with the Royal Bank only the latter's bills are put into circulation.

Already six millions in Traders' bills have been recalled from circulation—and have been burned.

One and a half millions of the bills are still out.

"Some of these will probably never come in," said Mr. Garland today. "You will find them at the four corners of the globe."

NO LONGER GOVERNOR OF NEW JERSEY

Trenton, N.J., March 1—President-elect Wilson ceased to be governor of New Jersey today, when his resignation of the office came into effect and he was succeeded automatically by James Fielder, president of the State senate. Mr. Wilson will spend tomorrow in taking leave of old friends here and in completing the preparations for removal to Washington. The hour of departure for the national capital has been fixed for 11 o'clock Monday morning. The party will arrive in Washington at 4 p.m. In the evening the President-elect will attend a smoker to be given in his honor by the Princeton alumni association of the District of Columbia. Mr. Wilson and his family will pass the night at the Shoreham Hotel as guests of Mr. Wilson's cousin, John E. Wilson of Franklin, Pa.

FOR GREATER SAFETY ON THE HIGH SEAS

London, March 1—The regulations formulated by the British Board of Trade looking to the greater safety of life at sea became operative today. In general the regulations provide that all seagoing ships shall be equipped with lifeboats and life saving appliances sufficient to accommodate the entire passenger list. Steamships carrying passengers on short excursions during the summer months must be supplied with boats for 70 per cent of the total number of persons they are certified to carry. Passenger steamers on canals, rivers and lakes must have boats, life rafts, etc., sufficient for 40 per cent of the number of passengers for which the ship is certified.

Public service commission of Maryland approves conditionally B. and O. \$63,500,000 bond issue, subject to ruling of court of appeals.

The proposal to dismiss German army officers who engage in duelling has met opposition, the Reichstag's resolution being rejected by the Bundesrath.
