STOCK MARKET

New York, March 3—Prices were
higher but trading was light at
opening of the market, traders being
inclined to wait developments at
Washington. Amal. Copper was a
strong feature of the market, its rise
being based partially on decreased
stocks of copper abroad and sharp
advance in London metal prices. The
make-up of Mr. Wilson's cabinet still
seemed to play an important part
in the feeling of commitments.

Shortly after opening there was a
spurt of activity which carried prices
up sharply and forces covering of a
good many shorts in active list.
There was, however, absence of bull-
ish aggressiveness, the large interests
being in favor of continuance of dull-
ness for the present.

Advance was led by Reading and
Copper stocks. Accumulation of
Reading is believed to have been go-
ing on for some time past and in
many places there is expectation of
an important development in the
near future.

REV. W. H. SMITH ON CIVIC POLITICS

(Continued from page one)

All the questions of sanitation, in-
dustry, education, amusement, ad-
ministration of justice must be con-
sidered on their merit. At present
organized evil has been allowed to
fasten upon the corporate life of the
city, to dominate the city, spreading
lawlessness, crime and poverty with
it. The first thing in the redemption
of the city is the abolition of power
of unrighteousness, when this tyr-
anny is broken the real business of the
city can be attended to.

MEMORABLE RECORD

There is a duty resting upon every
elector in this city. The administra-
tion of justice is a carnival of law-
lessness. The civic year has a most
unenviable record. The facts made
public, the acknowledgements of in-
competence, the utter lack of dis-
cipline and respect for authority as
reported in the press tell their weird
tale of how thoroughly the spirit of
indifference to the public good has
permitted the administration. We
were told with great promise that
the new order instituted would be
satisfactory. It is no doubt to the
interests which dominate the admin-
istration of justice. If the police
have a free hand it is a helpless,
hopeless hand. The same old meth-
ods prosper, the same lawlessness
abounds and there is excellent rea-
son for believing the present force is
doing just what it was hired to do.
Otherwise one would expect to see it
dismissed. Every man who desires a
clean, progressive city must first of
all strike a strong blow at the
forces of unrighteousness now domi-
nating the city. To fail to do this is
to be partaker of the guilt involved
in the present order.

INDEPENDENT COMMISSION

Again a strong movement is on
foot to place the administration of
justice in the hands of an independent
commission (which will give a reason-
able protection and enforcement of
law. At present we have local op-
tion in law enforcement. The whim
of one man can so interfere with the
processes of justice that a regiment
of law breakers are accorded all the
privileges of the land and their sup-
port eagerly sought in the questions
of grave importance to the city. The
present situation is deplorable and
the interests of the city demand that
steps be taken to remove the
administration of justice from the
disgraceful inefficiency into which it
has fallen. A Police Commission in-
dependent of the popular or local sen-
timent is not a novel experiment but
result of years of earnest thought
by leading statesmen. It has become
a recognized instrument of wise ad-
ministration. An opportunity is now
at hand whereby we may declare our
readiness to march in line with mod-
ern methods of democracy. It will
mean much to the life of the city to
remove the administration of justice
from civic politics. It will be the
first step in the cleansing of the city.
