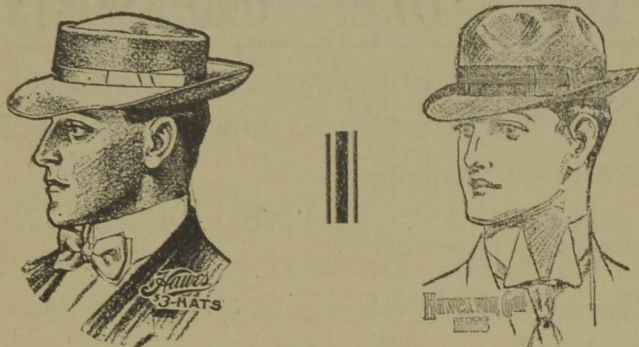

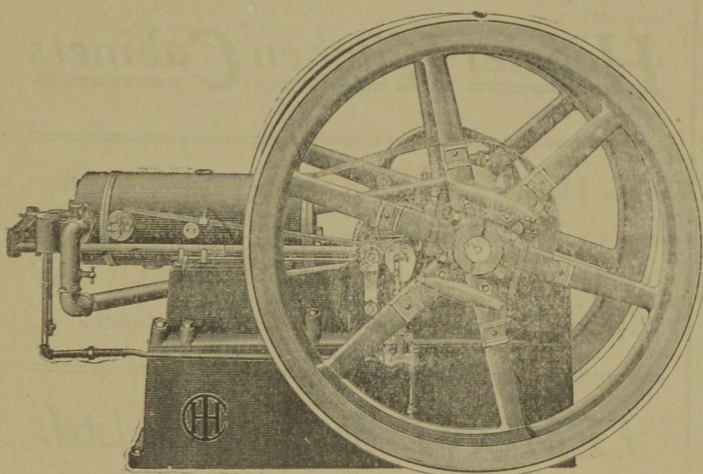

The smallest crowd of the season saw one of the best matches of the local schedule. Toronto pressed Ottawa hard and would have won had it not been for the sensational work of Lesuer and the solid checking of the defence in front of the star net guardian.

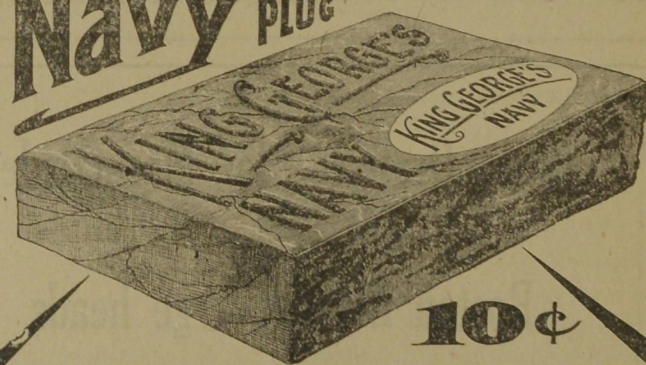
