CONTESTS WILL
OCCUR IN ALL
WARDS OF CITY

Many Nomination Papers Filed at City Hall This Morning—Mayor Hooper Will Not Be Opposed

Up to one o'clock this afternoon the nomination papers for the civic election which is to be held on Monday next, had been filed by twelve candidates, including Mayor W. S. Hooper, who offers for re-election and is unopposed. Indications are that there will be contests for aldermanic honors in all of the five wards that in Queens being three-cornered. There are rumors, however, that eleventh hour candidates may offer and make things more interesting. The ticket which is in opposition to the present city council had eight of the nine candidates that are intended nominated this morning. Mr. Robert Scott, who it is expected, will run on this ticket in Carleton Ward, had not been nominated. Mr. M. E. Doohan is mentioned as a running-mate for Ald. T. S. Wilkinson in that ward. Six members of the present council are to be in the field, and of that number Ald. Moore and Ald. Farrell filed their papers this morning. Ald. Guthrie is mentioned as a possible running-mate for Mr. J. Fred Ryan in Wellington Ward, although he has announced that he has retired. Ex-Ald. C. J. Kelly has been nominated in St. Anne's Ward. No Labor candidates are to be placed in the field.

POLICE COMMISSION
BILL TO BE PRESENTED
AFTER CIVIC ELECTION

No Conference With City Council Tonight—Promoters of Legislation on Consultation Have Decided Against Such Action

There is to be no conference this evening when the City Council will meet in committee, between members of the council and the promoters of a bill to establish an independent police commission for Fredericton. Such a conference had been suggested but the promoters of the bill upon consultation decided that such a conference would be productive of no result, their views have been contained in the largely signed petition which had been presented to the City Council sometime ago.

The bill is not to be presented to the House of Assembly until after the civic election to be held on Monday next. A meeting may be called after that day at which the views of the citizens with regard to the form such an independent commission should have may be obtained.

The promoters of the bill are not added to a commission which is composed according to the suggestions made to the City Council when the petition was presented. That in it is said was suggested because was thought to be most acceptable to the members of the Council.
