DEMOCRATS PROGRESS ON TARIFF REVISION

Washington, May 2—The Democratic majority went ahead with tariff revision in the House again today without a serious hitch. There were innumerable amendments emanating from the minority, but they were voted down with monotonous regularity.

The discussion opened with citrus fruits in the agricultural schedule, the Pacific coast growers waging an unsuccessful fight against the cutting of the tariff on lemons, figs, raisins and dried grapes and other coast products. The schedule covering spirits, wines and other beverages went through without dissent, but a considerable fight was made by the representatives of textile districts when the cotton schedule was reached.

DEBATE BITTERLY PARTISAN

Many of the speeches really dealt with the paragraphs of the tariff under consideration, but general politics and partisan personalities featured the debate. Representatives Thomas of Kentucky had a few things to say about the Republicans personally, and the debate for a moment promised interesting developments when Representative Leader Mann, stung by Mr. Thomas' reference to him as "the bewhiskered gentleman from Illinois," retorted that while it was true he was "bewhiskered," at least he was not "bewhiskered."

Representative Thomas called the Progressive party a "patent medicine advertisement scheme," and criticized Representative Payne of New York for reflecting on President Wilson because the President went to New Jersey in connection with State legislation.

Representative Heplin of Alabama declared that the American people paid \$2,400,000,000 instead of \$300,000,000 of revenue tax, and arraigned the Republican claim that the law protected the American farmer and laborer.

Several committee amendments were agreed to changing the bill in minor particulars, including one designed to put the sweetened varieties of chocolate and cocoa on the list of the higher basis of confectionery.

REPUBLICANS SPLIT

The split in the Republican minority of the Ways and Means Committee on the question of offering a substitute for the cotton schedule was evidenced during the consideration of the cotton tariff. Representatives Moore of Pennsylvania and Fordney of Michigan insisted that minority substitutes were a waste of time, but Representative Gardner of Massachusetts offered a substitute for three paragraphs of the cotton schedule, a compromise between the Underwood and the Payne tariffs. This was voted down, along with all other amendments from the Republican side.

TORONTO'S RECEPTION TO SIR WILFRID LAURIER

Toronto, May 5—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's meeting here tonight was a remarkable spectacle. The intensity of the interest and enthusiasm which characterized the whole proceedings was made strikingly manifest in the eagerness with which the mammoth throng filled the Arena.

By six o'clock, two hours before the scheduled hour of commencement crowds were gathered around the various entrances and steady streams of humanity were converging on the building from all parts of the city.

There were thousands from out of town, and the badges they wore proclaimed that every part of the Province, from the great unorganized districts of the north, to the south western peninsula, was represented.

ENTHUSIASTIC LIBERALS

It was Liberalism aroused, eager, enthusiastic, yea, and militant. Rubbing shoulders were the veteran, white-haired and wrinkled, with the battles of yesterday, and the clear eyed, strong limbed youth, whose strong and resonant plaudits rang with enthusiasm for the struggles of the morrow. There were hundreds of ladies, whose interest and enthusiasm was evidenced time and again in the gay fluttering of showers of handkerchiefs.

The great throng was on edge. No opportunity was lost to strike the note of tense exultant enthusiasm. During the two hours in which the gathering awaited the arrival of "the Chief," they busied themselves in cheering prominent arrivals. The first strains of "The Red, White and Blue," from the band of the 48th Highlanders, were greeted with unrestrained enthusiasm.

CHEERED ONTARIO LEADERS

The entrance of Sir Allen Aylesworth, Mr. N. W. Rowell, M. P. P., and the various Ontario members of Parliament was heartily honored. Sir Allen and Mr. Rowell were obliged

repeatedly to acknowledge the ovations with which they were greeted.

Withal, there was a tense militancy to the great gathering. Every reference to the Borden-Rogers "gag" was greeted with waves of hissing and "shames," while the remotest allusion to the insult shown to Sir Wilfrid Laurier when the revered Liberal Chieftain was refused the right to speak in Parliament, after he had been recognized by the Speaker, brought forth such volumes of groans as bore evidence to the abiding and indomitable sense of indignation which characterizes Ontario Liberalism.

A UNIQUE SPECTACLE

It was a unique and significant spectacle in Tory Toronto to witness the greatest gathering in the city's history manifest its stinging contempt for the tactics of a Government which has shown itself afraid to face the Canadian people. Last night's events scrolled unmistakably the handwriting on the wall for the Borden-Rogers-Pelletier-Nantel coalition in Ontario.

The entrance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the signal of an enthusiastic outburst of long-sustained cheers. As accompanied by Hon. George P. Graham, Hon. Charles Murphy, Dr. Michael Clark of Red Deer, and Mr. Fred F. Pardee, Chief Liberal Whip, he passed up the long aisle to the platform, he was the recipient of ovation after ovation.

WELCOMES THE CHIEF

Men and women stood upon their chairs and cheered again and again. As Sir Wilfrid stepped upon the platform the 48th Highlanders banded the great chorus song in "O Canada." For several moments the Liberal Chief was detained acknowledging the enthusiasm of the great gathering. Then again the throng rose and joined in the resonant singing of the National Anthem.

THE LONDON TIMES ON NAVAL DEBATE

London, May 3—Colonel Allen's speeches during his Canadian visit are arousing considerable interest here, several papers having special cables. The principal editorial in today's Times is devoted to the Ottawa naval debate as set forth in Hansard, which is just to hand.

"Our Parliament at Westminster is," says The Times, "in fact as well as in name an Imperial Parliament, but it is questionable whether it has ever attempted on any occasion since the debates which preceded the American War of Independence to enter so thoroughly and earnestly as the Canadian Parliament is now doing into the political meaning of the bond between the mother country and her daughter communities.

The Times then reviews the Borden and Laurier speeches, and concludes:

"We must confess to sharing Mr. Borden's inability to see how his proposals can be held to entail the very wide consequences which Sir Wilfrid Laurier described. But the argument between Laurier and him presents Canadian statesmanship in so broad and impressive a light that it is difficult wholly to deplore the divisions which have brought the argument out. If Laurier's contention that Imperial federation is impossible without the surrender of the control of all national tariffs within the Empire to a single body were to be generally sustained, the prospect would be as unwelcome to British as to Canadian opinion. But for our own part we regard the argument as too absolute. The question as to what responsibilities in policy and defence can be shared between autonomous Governments is a different question from that of how the funds required for common use are to be raised. It seems to us that Imperial organization need not be complicated at all by the problems of taxation which Laurier very rightly decries."

MEMORIAL ALTAR UNVEILED IN NEW YORK

New York, May 6—A magnificent altar erected in St. Patrick's Cathedral in memory of Mrs. Ellen A. Dykers de Navarro was unveiled today with impressive exercises conducted in the presence of a throng of distinguished guests. The memorial cost \$25,000 and was presented to the Cathedral by Madame Navarro's two sons, Alfonso and Antonio, the last named of whom is the husband of Mary Anderson the famous American actress.
