## In Chancery of New Jersey

In the matter of application of The Prudential Insurance Company of America for the acquirement of its capital stock for the benefit of its policyholders.

Order fixing hearing on Application for Appointment of Appraisers.

It appearing to the Court that The Prudential Insurance Company of America has heretofore filed its duly verified petition from which it appears that the said petitioner is a stock life insurance corporation, incorporated by the State of New Jersey and that the Board of Directors of said Company have determined that it would be conducive to the welfare of the corporation and in the interests of the policyholders thereof to change the corporation from a stock life insurance corporation to a mutual life insurance corporation and said corporation now applying to the Chancellor to appoint two or more disinterested persons to appraise the value of the capital stock of the said corporation and also to appoint one or more counsel to represent the policyholders before such appraisers and in such further proceedings as may be taken under or in pursuance of said petition.

It is, therefore, on this twenty-second day of April A. D. 1913, on motion of Edward D. Duffield, Solicitor of said petitioner, ORDERED that said application be heard by the Chancellor at the State House in the City of Trenton on the tenth day of June 1913, at ten thirty o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, at which time and place the Chancellor will hear all parties in interest who may then appear.

It is further ordered that notice of such hearing shall be given to the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance of this State by serving a copy of this order upon him within fifteen days from the making thereof, and that notice of said application be given to the stockholders of said corporation by mailing a copy of this order to each of said stockholders at his post-office address, as the same appears upon the books of the said corporation, within fifteen days of the date hereof, and that notice of said application be given to the policyholders of the said corporation by publishing a copy of this order in one or more newspapers printed and published in the capital of each and every State of the United States in which the corporation does business and in a newspaper printed and published in the cities of Edmonton, Alberta; Victoria, British Columbia; Winnipeg, Manitoba; Fredericton, New Brunswick; Halifax, Nova Scotia; Toronto, Ontario; Quebec, Quebec and Regina, Saskatchewan in the Dominion of Canada, once a week for at least four weeks, the first publication to be made within fifteen days from the date hereof. In case no newspaper is published in the capital of said States of the United States, then said publication may be made in a newspaper having a general circulation within said States.

## THE CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page one.)

Petitions from J. E. Clayton and Wm. W. Long for relief from taxation were referred to the Assessment Appeals Committee.

A petition from John J. Malloy and William Lyons of the Pumping Station staff for increased pay was referred to the Water Committee.

A communication from the Board of Health to the effect that the Police Station was in an unsanitary condition was referred to the Administration of Justice Committee.

Speaking with regard to the communication Ald. Weddall said he had inspected the police station and found it unfit to put an animal in much less a human being.

## CITY ENGINEER RESIGNS

The resignation of City Engineer John O'Neill to take effect May 20, or at a date previous was received. Ald. Farrell raised the point that the City Engineer still was in office having been appointed May 20, 1912. There was much cross firing between him and Ald. Mitchell on the matter and the resignation was finally accepted, salary to be paid until the expiration of his term of office.

Ald. Farrell in this connection stated that Mr. O'Neill had been driven out of the country by the action of the council.

Ald. Mitchell stated that the council had decided that for a year at least it would not be necessary to fill the office of City Engineer.

Ald. Farrell replied that Ald. Mitchell's statement seemed to imply that he was leader of the dominant party in the council.

## CITY CLERK'S SALARY

Ald. Clark stated that the matter of fixing the City Clerk's salary was yet to be settled. In his mind there was no doubt that it had been the intention of the majority of the Council to give the City Clerk a salary of \$1,200. If the mayor had declared a motion to that effect lost he (Clark) had not heard it. The increased salary had been favored by the majority on account of changes made by the revised by-laws. He moved that J. W. McCready be appointed City Clerk at a salary of \$1,200 per year, the appointment to date from May 1 and the salary to cover services of the office legal and otherwise.

His Worship stated that he never gave a decision in a whisper and when he had declared the motion lost he said it plainly and several aldermen heard him.

## ALD. FARRELL OBJECTS

Ald. Farrell raised the point that the motion should be shown in the minutes as lost and had to be reconsidered.

His Worship declared that the motion would have to be one of reconsideration.

Ald. Clark moved for reconsideration stating in response to the Mayor that he had voted with the majority on the original motion. Ald. Rogers seconded the motion.

Ald. Farrell submitted that Ald. Clark was not competent to make the motion and the City Clerk not competent to give information on the point.

His Worship stated that he would have to take Ald. Clark's statement although he must have voted against his own motion.

Ald. Clark stated that he had not voted against his motion, but still had voted with the majority.

## ANOTHER OBJECTION

Ald. Farrell pointed out that the City by-laws provided that a month's notice had to be given for a reconsideration. There evidently was an omission and those by-laws had been revised by J. W. McCready, B. A.

Ald. Mitchell pointed out that the by-laws had been revised under the direction of the old council. Members of that body evidently could not interpret their own work. It was evident that some one else was in need of instruction in English.

Mayor Hooper—"That is a hard crack at the City Clerk."

Ald. Mitchell—"It is not intended for him. It is intended for a member of the old council and for yourself."

Mayor Hooper—"I said before that I would have due respect shown the chair. That is a slur and you have been slurring me repeatedly. Do you want me to take these by-laws and enforce them to the letter?"

Ald. Mitchell—"As an alderman I have a right to criticize your ruling on this matter."

## MATTER RECONSIDERED

Ald. Clark's motion to reconsider was put and carried. His motion to appoint the City Clerk then was considered being seconded by Ald. Weddall.

## AMENDMENT MOVED

Ald. Rogers protested that the salary of \$1,200 was too much. In amendment he moved that the salary be \$1,000, to cover all duties. Ald. Hoben seconded the amendment.

Ald. Everett stated that he was pleased to get an opportunity to discuss the matter. The extras given the City Clerk had averaged only \$200 per year. He thought the salary of \$1,000 would be ample.

The amendment was carried on the following vote:

## MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Ald. Clark suggested that a bathing house be provided for boys' swimming at the Flats. Private subscription might provide for this but it would be better to have it under the jurisdiction of the Administration of Justice Committee. He moved that such a bathing-house to screen swimmers while undressing be constructed at a cost of twenty dollars and placed between Shore and Lansdowne Streets.

The motion was carried. Thomas Wandlass, Peter Duffie and John Tucker were appointed constables.

An appeal of Thomas Purvis for relief from the payment of poll-tax was referred to the Assessment Appeals Committee.

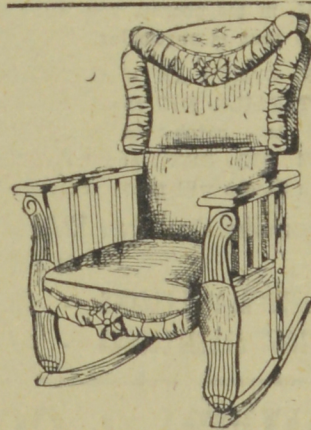
