AUSTRIAN FACES
CHARGE OF FORGERY
IN POLICE COURT

Robert J. Snillbilston Arrested on Information of T. Arduis Kik Who is Held for Trying to Cash Cheque

Robert J. Snillbilston, an Austrian was arrested late yesterday afternoon on the Marysville spur of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway on the charge of forgery. The arrest was made by Chief of Police McCollom and Special Policeman Roberts, who, accompanied by Mr. R. J. Arnill, accountant for Smith & Merrithew, who are prosecuting, went out to the work of A. E. Trites & Son on the Marysville spur and found the man in a crew of laborers. He was brought to the city and was identified by T. Arduis Kik, another Austrian who was arrested Monday for trying to cash a Royal Bank cheque of Smith & Merrithew, which had been raised from \$8.40 to \$80.40. It was on the information of Kik that the police arrested the other Austrian, he having stated that Snillbilston had raised the cheque and given it to him. A scar on the neck was the means of identifying Snillbilston.

The accused appeared in the police court this morning and was remanded till tomorrow. He displayed an ignorance of the English language that is said to be feigned. Kik, when first arrested, professed ignorance of the English language but later showed that he was able to speak.

Three attempts to raise checks of Smith & Merrithew have been made by foreign laborers and it is thought that Snillbilston has had a hand in all three.

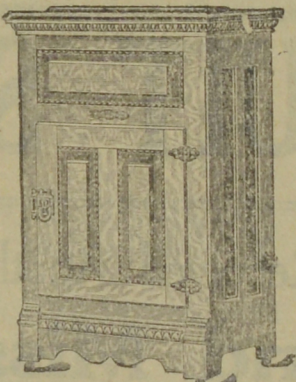
