HOW THE LABOR ACT IS ABUSED OVER NORTH

To the Editor of the Mail:

Dear Sir:—I hope you will give me space in your valuable paper to call attention of the Provincial Government and the public generally to the settlement of crown lands through the Labour Act as it now exists here.

I beg to say that I have always favored the present administration but if they follow their course of destroying the forest I will certainly draw the line.

When the present government came into power it appeared to be a signal for every man that was able to pay for running lines to draw one hundred acres and lay claim to it and go to work and cut and haul and sell everything above ground without occupying it one day.

Some of those parties have put up little board buildings which they do never see except when they are hauling away the lumber.

There are lots of teams in Doaktown and vicinity and likely over the province engaged in hauling stuff from those lots.

The poplar have been cut and peeled during summer and in winter, spruce of all sizes have been cut and hauled away so that now there are places like an open plain.

There is one man here that claims four hundred acres for his four sons. None of them ever lived on it one day; and two of them have been in the States the last three years. Now if some man wants a few cords of wood he is very often compelled to buy it from those self-styled owners who have no right to it. Some people have called on the labour act commissioner to see if he would not stop this wholesale slaughter, but he informed them that he had no orders to that effect and would not do it without being paid.

Surely the government is not going to let this thing continue for if matters do continue as at present it will be only a few years till there won't be a green tree in sight. There is some parties living on their lots and likely will do as the law requires but the largest part of them are only just skinning the lumber of it.

If the government have any doubt of the accuracy of this statement they can employ some man that is acquainted with the locality to hunt out the landings which are along the river and where some pulp wood have been shipped.

Under the present government as soon as the Justice begins to write an application for a man the applicant begins to grind his axe and get his logging rigging in shape. Now this did not exist under the old government although they got as many bonfire settlers as this government, and they saved the forest from the devastation which it is receiving under the present government.

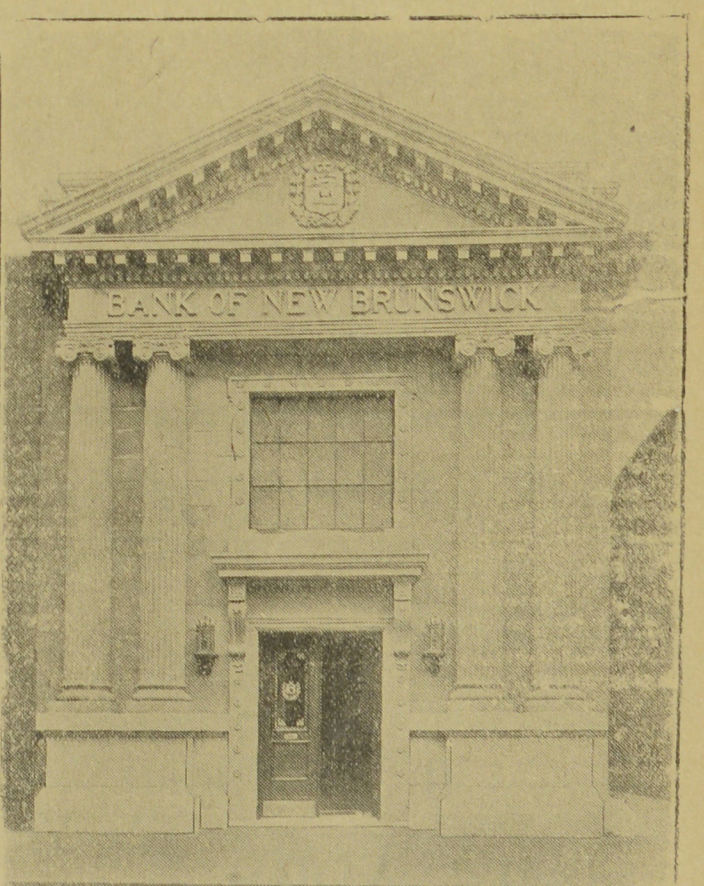
