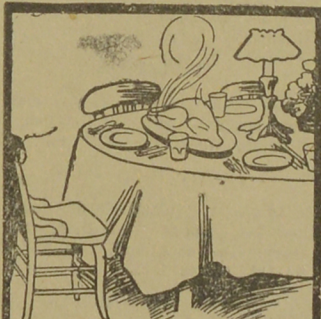
KID GRAVES WON

DOHERTY AND SCOTT SUSPENDED BY M. P. H. ASSOC.,

"Cap" McDonald of Sydney Charged
With Attempting Bribery and Will
be Investigated Shortly

Halifax, N.S., Feb. 19—At a meeting of the M.P.H.A. at Truro tonight Harry Scott and "Doc" Doherty until last Friday captain of the Moncton Victorias were suspended from playing in the M.P.H.A. games for the balance of the season for jumping contracts, even with the consent of their employers; while "Cap" McDonald pilot of the Sydney Millionaires, has been forbidden to play until charges of attempted bribery on his part are investigated by the league executive.

Scott was released from the Halifax Crescents last week and immediately signed on with Moncton. Almost simultaneously "Doc" Doherty left the Victorias and appeared in a Crescent's uniform in last Friday's game with the Vics.

As this shifting of players was contrary to the rules which allowed such procedure only prior to February first the executive of the M.P.H.A., at their special session tonight held this was illegal and imposed penalties accordingly.

Another meeting is fixed for next Wednesday when the bribery charge will be aired. In an affidavit placed before the executive tonight Goal Tender Cross for Moncton alleges that "Cap" McDonald offered him money to "throw" the game played on Tuesday, Feb. 11, between Sydney and Moncton.

GERMANS LAUGH AT BRITISH WAR SCARE

Berlin, Feb. 17—The German press, replying to the Tories in The London Daily Express and The Engineer about Germany building a secret fleet and a new type of wonderful warships, indulges in sarcasm and satire.

The Post says the London papers do not have all the details. The shots of the new type will be magnetized, so that they cannot miss. British dreadnought which attracts heat. The explosion of a single shell will completely melt a British dreadnought. It is added that the Navy Department is considering the question of turning Heligoland into a gigantic magnet, to which an English dreadnought will stick. It also intends to build a large asylum on Heligoland, which is to be used exclusively for crazy English journalists.

The Berliner Gazette says the new ship can be instantly turned into an aeroplane, which can level London in five minutes, or the mere pressure of a button it can be transformed into a conference hall, where peace preliminaries can be signed.

London, Feb. 16—"The Engineer," a technical paper of the highest reputation, gives details of a formidable and entirely new type of warship which is being constructed for the German Admiralty and will revolutionize naval warfare. The design was first offered to the British Government, but beyond the bare acknowledgement no further action was taken.

The new type is described as speedier than any Dreadnought. It lies low in the water, not much more than awash, and fights end on. The only target it presents to the enemy's fire is a bow shield, sloping backward, and of such shape and thickness as to be virtually impenetrable. It serves as the carriage of a single gun of maximum power, furnished with projectiles that play the part of aerial torpedoes, and the gun remains perpetually screened, except at the moment of firing.

The vessel can keep at sea in all weathers and fight effectively at the longest ranges. Twenty of these destroyers can be built for the cost of a single super-dreadnought, and German naval experts hold that a super-dreadnought must inevitably succumb if attacked by even five such small craft.

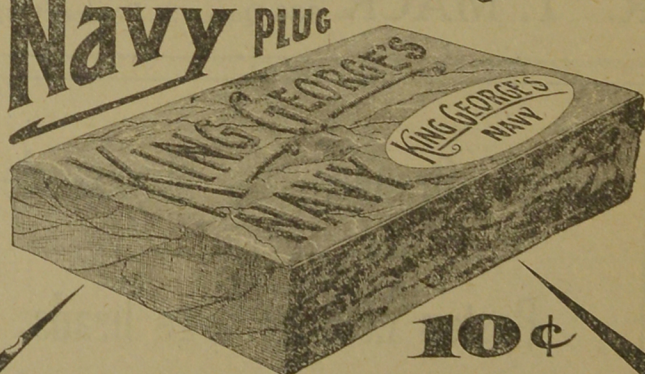
