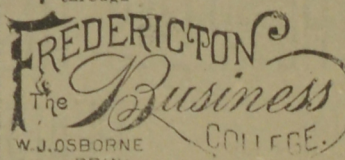

STRAY TOPICS FROM
LITTLE OLD NEW YORK

New York, Jan. 25.—Between police
investigations, strikes, the "arson
trust" muddle, the suffrage agitation
and the disgraceful disclosures
concerning the abuse of the pardon-
ing power by Governor Dix, there is
always something new, something
going on in this old town. If there
should be a little lull once in a
while some big crime or accident is
sure to occur to fill in the gap. The
strikes of the hotel waiters and the
garment workers are still continuing
but, excepting the incendiary speeches
of Ettor and the other I.W.W. agi-
tators, furnish but little excitement.

Peaceful and law abiding citizens
are beginning to wonder how long
the authorities intend to wait before
they put a stop to the criminal meth-
ods of agitation of men like Ettor
and his associates of the I.W.W. The
principal reason for the ill-advised
forbearance of the authorities seems
to be the fear of doing anything that
might be interpreted as an infringem-
ent upon the sacred right of free
speech. This right of free speech,
although often too shamefully abused
by unscrupulous scoundrels in days
past as well as present, is consid-
ered rightfully one of the main
stays of liberty and, for that reason
is so carefully guarded that no one
seems to even dare the suggestion
that no matter how sacred that
right may be there should be some
limitation to prevent its abuse. It
would require great moral courage
on the part of any jury or court to
decide that utterances like those
made by Ettor and other anarchists
at different times constitute the
abuse of a constitutional right and
should not be tolerated. Their deci-
sion would undoubtedly cause a great
howl from the thousands of unthink-
ing persons who fail to grasp the
true meaning of constitutional
rights and the danger which lies in
their abuse.

How difficult it is to account for
differences of tastes and to please
everybody was chiefly shown last
week when, within two days one man
tried to escape from the Tombs, while
another, whose release had been or-
dered by the court, refused to leave
the shelter of the prison. The man
who tried to escape was a profes-
sional thief who had spent twenty-
eight years of his life in prison cells.
The man who refused to leave the
Tombs was an Italian who had been
arrested for carrying a revolver and
was awaiting the action of the Grand
Jury. As the Grand Jury had failed
to indict the man, his release was
ordered. But that did not suit the
prisoner said. "I like it in the
Tombs too well. I get good hot
food and they give me steam heat
and I can't see why I should want
to get out in the cold." The amus-
ing part of it was that as the man
refused to admit his identity he had
to be sent back to the Tombs until
witnesses could be found to identify
the man.

an ambitious New York student of
economics has "gone him one bet-

form the chief components of the
diet suggested and the amount of
food to be consumed is limited to
two and one-half ounces of food per
meal. The figures given by the origi-
nator of the new theory, to prove
that this diet would amply suffice
for the needs of the body, as they
contain all the protein, carbohydra-
tes, etc., required by the human sys-
tem, are quite impressive but scarce-
ly convincing to the average individ-
ual.

John D. Rockefeller Sr., recently
added to his big estate at Pocantico
Hills by buying some property ad-
joining his estate from George Fer-
guson, an ice man. The new addition
includes a big pond from which the
former owner used to harvest his ice
crop. It is stated, however, that Mr.
Rockefeller does not intend to ven-
ture into the ice business.

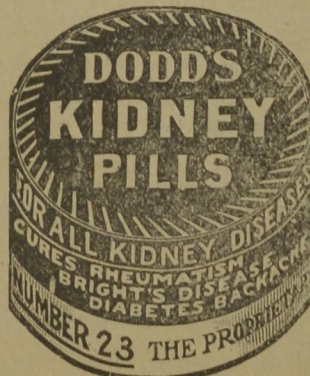
DRUG VICTIM'S ACT.

he wandered through the streets, in-

to be able to procure enough of the
drug to satisfy his craving. At last
the moment came when his resources
failed him and in a moment of des-
pair he thought came to the de-
graded victim to end it all. As a
last ray of hope the idea came to
him to sell his secret of the course
from which he obtained the cocaine
for enough to satisfy his craving
once more and then to place himself
in the hands of the law. This plan
he carried out. He informed two de-
tectives that he knew of a place
where cocaine and other tabooed
drugs were sold to habitual users
and volunteered to prove his state-
ment if they would give him enough
money to buy some of the drug. The
detectives agreed and the plan was
carried out. The man obtained his
"dope" the detectives arrested the
man who had sold it and also the
man who had given the information
and he will be sent to an institution
where an effort will be made to cure
him of the insane craving.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will pre-
sent at the approaching Session of
the Legislative Assembly of New
Brunswick the following bills for en-
actment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to
grant certain concessions to the Pal-
mer-McLellan Company, Limited, and
to fix the valuation of the property
of Frasers Limited in this City for
taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue
of Debentures for the erection of a
Fire Station, a Police Station, for
the purchase of Queen's Park and
for the further construction of Per-
manent Street Pavements, not ex-
ceeding in the whole the sum of
Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000)

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting
by electricity the Fredericton and
St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
