Curtain-Raiser of Hockey Season Was Fast and Interesting--Poor Ice Made Matters More Difficult for Players--Five Players in Penalty Box at one Time--Fredericton Held Lead Throughout Game--Teams Evenly Matched

Saturday night hockey made its debut in Fredericton night before last and a pretty good sized crowd turned out to see the Marysville Crescents and Fredericton play a game which was neck-and-neck until the end, when Fredericton won by the score of 4 to 3. Considering that the ice was in very poor condition the game was fast and the fact that either team had a chance to win right up to the time Referee Staples blew his whistle to end the game kept up the interest. The forwards on account of the roughness and unevenness of the ice, could do little passing and were very much off on their shooting. Practice will improve that however.

Both teams did their fastest playing at the beginning of the game and toward the close. Some of the players showed that they were not in fit shape to stand hard and fast playing.

PENALTIES IN A BUNCH.

Referee Staples was fairly sharp and handed out a number of penalties although there were some things he could not see. The players showed good feeling toward one another, the only serious breach of the peace concerning in the second half in a corner at the Fredericton end. "Tanker" Hughes and Pugh of Fredericton, and Brogan and MacMorris of the Crescents, were given a rest of five minutes each, though some put up the story that they were just trying to keep the others from doing any damage. Fred McLean joined them a minute later so that five players were on the roost at one time.

TEAMS EVENLY MATCHED.

The teams proved to be very evenly matched, although Marysville had been slightly favored before the game. The shooting on both sides was bad but the defense men played good hockey. Pond, the Fredericton goalkeeper, made many good stops and cleared his net pretty well but by running out of his net gave Marysville some good chances to score. For the Crescents Robinson played a steady game in goal and had lots to do. Walker was the most aggressive man of the Fredericton defence and his long rushes had a lot to do with the scoring for the winners. Frank Hughes used his weight to advantage but might have been in better condition. Of the Fredericton forwards Fred McLean was the most prominent and in spite of the poor ice skated fast and covered lots of territory. The two little wings of the Red and White, Arnold and Pugh, also played aggressive hockey and figured in the scoring, Arnold showing that he has a dangerous side shot. Marysville seemed to devote lots of attention to him and in some cases he failed to play his position. Alex. Galloway at centre, for Fredericton was not up to his standard of play. He failed to get going in the early stages of the game and in the second half a hard jab from Brogan's stick hurt him pretty badly. At point for Marysville George Brogan was as good as ever and Fred Wade's rushes helped the Crescent forwards out often. The Marysville wings had nothing on their opponents but at centre Irving Wade proved one of the best on the ice. MacMorris also played a good game.

GAME IN DETAIL.

The game began with a rush and the players set a fast pace till about the middle of the period when tired by the heavy going, they slowed down. Both goal-keepers had work to do early in the game and the defenses on account of the rushes of the forwards, had to relieve by taking the puck down the ice. The greater part of the half, however, saw play about the middle of the rink, with the forwards mixing things up and play pretty much of the individual variety. George Walker's long rushes were noticeable at all times and it was on one of these that he topped the first goal for Fredericton, after twenty-three minutes of play.

Fredericton had the Crescents going and a minute later Fred McLean got in on the Crescent net and put in a fine shot. Robinson saved a goal, however, but was not quick enough to stop Pugh's shot from the rebound. Fredericton 2, Marysville 0.

There was no more scoring in the first half and the second half began with the players not moving extra fast. Play saw-sawed for more than half the period without any score.
