



Scott Put up Particularly Wild Wail---
Players Say They Are Through
With East

Montreal, March 3.—"Never, never again," was the chorus feebly sung this morning by a quartette of scarred, battered, chopped and blackened hockey players from the East. They were with their afflictions, the following: Harry Scott, black eyes, missing teeth, smashed lips; Jack McGregor, black eyes, broken nose, chokped shins, cuts and bruises galore; Fred Carpenter, black eyes, Fred Walker, broken nose, two black eyes, various cuts and many bruises. It was McGregor's second time for a broken nose of the season. They are from Moncton N.B., on their way home to Ontario and the west after a strenuous season which they declared will be their last in the maritime professional hockey league.

Harry Scott, a newspaper man and the least injured of the party, acted as spokesman and voiced the sentiments of his fellow cripples that never while Sydney and its rough artists remained in the league would the majority of other upper Canadian players ever be tempted into journeying down to the eastern provinces again. 

Jim McAleer Makes Some Statements
About Ballplayers Their Ages and
What They Should Save

"A baseball player ought to be at his best between 30 and 35," said James R. McAleer the other day, "and he ought to save \$30,000 while in baseball."

If McAleer's remark is actually true then baseball is unquestionably the best of all outdoor sports, do far as the players thereof of athletics can a man, as a rule, stand the strain, after, say 27 or 28, and nearly all of them begin to go back at about 30. And how many men have saved \$30,000 at the age of 35?

"Of course a man isn't so fast after 30 as he was before," added the Red Sox president. "But he has learned to think by that time and he should be more valuable to his club after 30 than before always provided he has taken care of himself"
