CANDIDATES APPEAR
IN CIVIC FIELD

Ald. Burchill Nominated---Ex-Ald. Ross Withdraws From Contest---Delegation Suggests Names of Scrutineers to City Council

The number of candidates for civic honors as announced yesterday has been increased by the nomination of Ald. C. A. Burchill in Carleton Ward. Ald. Burchill at the earnest solicitation of his friends reversed his decision not to be a candidate and nominated last night. Mr. George Ross was nominated in St. Ann's Ward as an Independent Labor candidate but later withdrew the nomination for personal reasons.

SUGGESTED SCRUTINEERS.

The City Council at its regular meeting in committee, which was held last night, considered the matter of appointing returning officers, scrutineers, etc., for next Monday's election in accordance with the provisions of the election law of the City of Fredericton passed last year by the provincial legislature. A delegation representing the Citizens' Committee which has placed an aldermanic ticket in the field, appeared and suggested to the Council the names of five citizens to act as scrutineers at the five polls which are to be held in the city. The committee was composed of Messrs. Moses Mitchell, Howard Rogers and W. G. Clark.

Mr. Clark presented the request of the committee that it be permitted to have one scrutineer for each poll on the ground that the committee's candidates were running in the election.

Ald. Calder in reply expressed the opinion that the request was a reflection on the council which he considered to be perfectly competent to appoint two scrutineers as by law required. He had no doubt that honest officials could be selected by the council.

Mr. Mitchell at the Mayor's request also spoke. He stated that he regretted that Ald. Calder had spoken as he had. The delegation had placed a matter before the council, and that matter deserved consideration before being condemned. The request that the citizens requested by the delegation be appointed scrutineers was perfectly reasonable. He was sorry the alderman had spoken as he had.

SUGGESTION NOT FOLLOWED.

After the delegation withdrew the matter of appointing scrutineers selected who will be formally appointed tonight. The suggestion of the delegation was not followed making that selection.

TWO CASES BEFORE
DIVORCE COURT
THIS MORNING

Evidence in Case of Prince vs Prince Not Concluded---In Case of Johnson vs Johnson Court Considers

The Divorce Court, His Honor Judge McKeown presiding, began its regular sitting at eleven o'clock this morning. Two cases were before the court, Johnson vs. Johnson and Prince vs. Prince. When court adjourned at 1 p.m. to meet at 3 p.m. the cases of Prince vs. Prince was still going on. Dr. W. J. Weaver was the first witness when court resumed this afternoon.

PRINCE VS. PRINCE

The case of Susan M. Prince vs. Harold W. Prince is a local case the plaintiff formerly Miss McCutcheon residing here. The defendant who is a chauffeur now resides in St. John having left this city some months ago. The two were married in January 1909 at St. John Rev. Gideon Swim performing the ceremony. They lived together until 1911. One child was born of the union about a year after the marriage and died at the age of eleven months having swallowed a poisonous tablet which it found upon the floor.

The plaintiff applies for divorce on statutory grounds. Mr. P. A. Guthrie is proctor. Kathleen Murray is named as co-respondent. This morning Mr. R. W. L. Tibbitts, deputy provincial secretary, and the plaintiff gave evidence. The evidence of the plaintiff had to do with her domestic life.

The case of Burton Arthur Johnson vs. Vernie Elsie Johnson (formerly Cameron) was heard this morning before Judge McKeown. The parties were married in February 1911 at Newcastle by the Rev. Henry T. (Continued on page 5)
