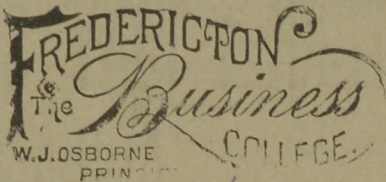

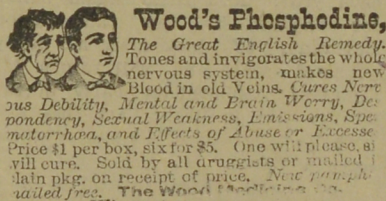

NOTED INVENTOR DID
MUCH FOR MANKIND

London, Jan. 18—It will be one hundred years tomorrow since there was born in a little village in Hertfordshire a man whose life, according to the opinions expressed by the newspapers at the time of his death fifteen years ago, had been more useful to humanity than that of any other one person. The man was Sir Henry Bessemer, who will be known as the inventor of the process for converting cast iron into steel without the use of fuel.

Bessemer did for the steel industry what Newton did for astronomy and what Darwin did for natural science. The revolution in that industry following upon the discovery of applied steam power.

Before the Bessemer process came into vogue the production of steel in Great Britain was only 50,000 tons annually, and the average price was \$250 a ton. In 1911 the production in the United Kingdom reached 6,500,000 tons. In the same year the United States produced nearly 25,000,000 tons. The saving to the world by the cheapening of steel is estimated at \$250,000,000 a year—equal to more than one-half the world's entire output of gold for the same period.

LANCASHIRE UNIONISTS
WILL TAKE ACTION

London, Jan. 17—The course of action to be taken by the Lancashire division of the National Unionist Association at its adjourned meeting to be held in Manchester tomorrow is the staple topic of discussion today among politicians of all parties. The meeting will mark the crisis in the controversy that threatens the disruption of the Unionist party. In Unionist circles it is admitted that the Manchester meeting will decide the fate of Bonar Law as the party leader. According to the general belief Mr. Bonar Law is certain to resign his leadership if any resolution calling for a referendum on food taxes or for a second general election is carried at the meeting, or if a resolution is passed criticising the recent management of the party.

POINCAIRE ELECTED
PRESIDENT OF FRANCE

Versailles, France Jan. 17—Raymond Nicolas Landry Poincare, for the past twelve months of the French cabinet was elected president of the republic of France today by the national assembly, composed of members of both chambers of parliament, in succession to President Armand Fallieres, whose seven years' term expires February 18.

The wildest confusion out of which arose two challenges to duels, marked the casting of the ballots. Premier Poincare was chosen president on the second ballot, his plurality over his nearest competitor, Jules Pams, minister of agriculture being 187. The deciding vote stood as follows: Raymond Poincare, 483; Jules Pams, 296; Marc Edouard Vaillant, 69.

Raymond Poincare's first words upon being officially informed of his election as President of France were: "I shall try to show myself worthy of the confidence of the national assembly. I shall forget without effort the struggles of yesterday and the injuries. Be convinced that I shall seek in everything and at all times to be an impartial administrator."

Raymond Poincare's selection for the presidency of France, although made by a parliament as required by the constitution is regarded as representing as well the popular will of the nation. The choice took place on the second ballot, the premier receiving 483 votes out of a total of 859 cast, or fifty-three more than an absolute majority of the assembly.

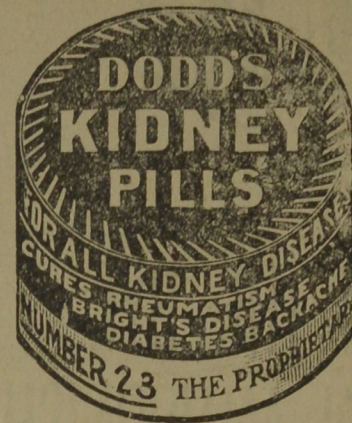

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
