FORESTRY STUDENTS
OF U. N. B. HAVE
SECURED POSITIONS

Three Seniors Who Will be Graduated in May Had Choice of Positions
---Forestry School Attracting Many Students

It is announced by Prof. R. B. Miller, dean of the School of Forestry at the University of New Brunswick that the three students who form the senior class and who will be given their degrees in May next have accepted positions in which they will take up the work of their profession after graduation. The three are H. B. Murray of Moncton, K. R. Machum of St. John and R. K. Shives of Campbellton. The yearly salary at which they will take up forestry in permanent practice will be \$1400.

WHERE THEY GO

The three students mentioned all received offers from the Dominion Government's Forestry Department. Mr. Shives has decided to take the position offered by that department. Mr. Machum will take a position with the C. P. R. with which he worked last summer. Mr. Murray will join the forestry service of the province of British Columbia. Mr. Machum is spoken of very highly by R. D. Pettie Superintendent of Forestry for the C.P.R. who visited this city recently. Mr. Pettie became acquainted with Mr. Machum's work while the latter was in the west during last summer's vacation.

PROSPECTS BRIGHT

Prof. Miller believes that the prospects of the Forestry School at U. N. B. are exceedingly bright. Only three classes have been graduated by the school so far but already the course is attracting a large number of students and the classes are increasing in size. Of the two graduates of 1912, Mr. G. H. Prince has a position on the Cranbrook District of British Columbia and Mr. Guy Fitz Randolph is engaged in lumbering in this province. The demand for trained foresters is increasing and the supply will not begin to meet that demand for some years.

HEATER-CAR
SERVICE WILL BE
RESUMED SHORTLY

W. B. Bamford District Freight Agent of C. P. R. Notifies Transportation Committee to That Effect--- Committee Met Last Night

Mr. W. B. Bamford, District Freight Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway has notified Mr. George Y. Dibblee, secretary of the Transportation Committee of the Board of Trade that the heater-car service to this city is to be resumed probably this week. Mr. Bamford will give advice concerning the matter.

The heater-car service on the C. P. R. is a great convenience to many merchants and citizens and in former winters was in operation. Recently the Railway Commission fixed a minimum amount of freight which would make necessary a heater-car service and as Fredericton did not come within the minimum the service was not resumed this winter in spite of protest.

COMMITTEE MET

The Transportation Committee met last night and continued plans for obtaining information concerning all matters of discrimination against Fredericton in the matter of passenger-rates and freight-rates. The secretary, Mr. Dibblee, on account of a death in his family was not present. It is the intention of the committee to take into consideration any complaint made with regard to transportation by citizens. The committee will meet again shortly.


