Boston, Mass., Aug. 2-Knights of Columbus are arriving in Boston for the first event of the long program to be carried out at the national convention of the order, which lasts the entire week. The preparations for the reception and entertainment of the thousands of visitors are complete and there will be no difficulty in accommodating the great out-of-town throng.

Tomorrow will be devoted to the reception of the visitors. On Monday the supreme officers and National Board of Directors will hold their annual meetings. At 9 o'clock Tuesday morning the religious service that always marks the opening of the convention will be held in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross. When this is concluded the delegates will embark for Nantasket and the first of the business sessions of the con vention will be held aboard the boat. The sessions will continue through the week and will be interspersed with a variety of entertainment.

From New Haven, Conn., where it was founded in 1882, it has extended into nearly every State and into Canada. 
