COLUMBUS KNIGHTS AT BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Aug. 2—Knights of Columbus are arriving in Boston for the first event of the long program to be carried out at the national convention of the order, which lasts the entire week. The preparations for the reception and entertainment of the thousands of visitors are complete and there will be no difficulty in accommodating the great out-of-town throng.

Tomorrow will be devoted to the reception of the visitors. On Monday the supreme officers and National Board of Directors will hold their annual meetings. At 9 o'clock Tuesday morning the religious service that always marks the opening of the convention will be held in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross. When this is concluded the delegates will embark for Nantasket and the first of the business sessions of the convention will be held aboard the boat. The sessions will continue through the week and will be interspersed with a variety of entertainment.

Few fraternal societies of America have had such a strong, healthy growth as the Knights of Columbus. From New Haven, Conn., where it was founded in 1882, it has extended into nearly every State and into Canada. There are at present 52 State councils and more than 1,500 subordinate councils, with a total membership approaching 51,000. The present national officers are Supreme Knight, James A. Flaherty, of New Haven; National Secretary, William A. McGinley of New Haven, and National Treasurer, D. J. Callahan of Washington, D. C.

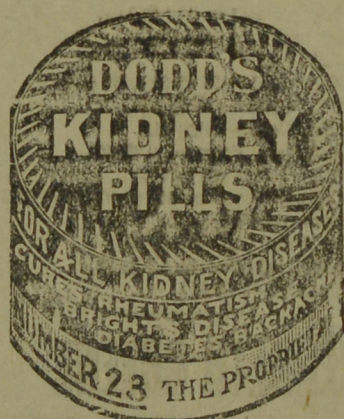

86 MILES ON ONE GALLON

All automobile economy records were shattered by S. C. Averell, of New York, when he drove a Franklin car 86.6 miles on one gallon of gasoline, Friday, June 20, on Long Island. The test was made under the auspices of the Automobile Club of America.

It was made just to show what is possible in the way of mileage of an automobile on a given quantity of fuel. The result was the most remarkable, far exceeding anything yet accomplished in the way of economy operation. The car covered 86.6 miles before it finally came to a stop, practically doubling the former world's gasoline economy's record of 46.1 miles, also made by a Franklin.

The car was driven by its owner, S. G. Averell, who was accompanied by Herbert E. Chase, laboratory chief of the Automobile Club of America, under whose direct supervision the test was made. The car was a four-cylinder Franklin of 18 horse power.
