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Having increased the stumpage rate the Fleming government at the next session should have the decency to repeal the law which imposes an extra burden of taxation on the Municipalities for the support of the Provincial Hospital. The ratepayers of the different parishes of York county will be remiss in their duty if they vote for a single candidate at the coming municipal elections who does not pledge himself to work tooth and nail for the repeal of that obnoxious law. They should at the same time be wary about accepting pledges from men who are feeding at the public trough.

Everybody is proud of the grand showing made by the pupils of the Fredericton High School at the Matriculation Examinations. A Fredericton girl has the honor of leading the province with a Fredericton boy a good second and out of eleven candidates who passed in first division no less than five were from the local High School. Principal Foster and the members of his staff have every reason to feel elated at the remarkable showing made by their pupils.

The Intercolonial Railway had a million dollar surplus last year yet the management found it necessary to boost the freight rates. The rail ways in the upper provinces have to face the competition of a splendid canal system established at the expense of the taxpayers and there is no reason in the world why freight rates on the I.C.R. should be on a par with those of a company owned road.

If the Federal elections were called on now the Borden government would not get a single seat along the line of the Intercolonial railway, so great is the popular feeling against the Czar methods of Minister Cochrane and his C. P. R. assistants.

A reference made by one of the speakers at the open air meeting on Phoenix Square on Saturday evening to the I.C.R. trouble elicited hearty applause. Public sentiment is strongly against Minister Cochrane and his tyrannical methods.

The Hon. Tom Crothers, minister of labor in the Borden government, is generally conceded to be a frost. It will be mighty hard at the next election for the Tories to work up enthusiasm for him among the laboring men.

Minister Cochrane is doing his level best to make government ownership and operation of the Intercolonial as unpopular as possible. In other words, he is playing into the hands of the C.P.R.

We have had a Tory government in power at Ottawa a little less than two years and already they have started in to open soup kitchens in the west. Toryism, taxes and hard times usually go hand in hand.

Premier Borden's "splendid leadership," to quote our old friend, the secretary-treasurer of York, seems to have balled things up on the Intercolonial railway.

The ticket collectors on the Canada Eastern branch of the Intercolonial have started in to make votes for the Liberal cause.

The Czar methods of Minister Cochrane are making a lot of votes for the Liberal cause in Northumberland county.

Heads of twelve western roads undertake vigorous campaign against low rate legislation, declaring two cent rate insufficient compensation for service demanded. Will appeal to Interstate Commerce and State Commissions.

A LAW

Be it enacted by the Board of Health of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. Food products intended for human consumption, and generally or frequently eaten without being cooked, and not enclosed in a natural inedible covering or rind, shall not be exposed for sale within or outside of any shop or other place of merchandise situate in the City of Fredericton, unless adequately protected by a suitable covering from flies and other insects, and from the dirt and dust of the place of exposure or street, whereon such place is situate. This By-Law shall however not apply to such food products exposed for sale in the Phoenix Square Market in the said City of Fredericton, during the hours established by law for the continuance of such market.

2. Dressed or partly dressed meat intended for human consumption, shall not be conveyed for commercial purposes over any street or highway of the City of Fredericton, unless efficiently protected by a suitable covering from insects, dust, and exposure to the weather, and such meat shall not be exposed for sale where it is liable to such contamination or injury, unless so protected. The term "Meat" in this By-Law, shall be held to include Fish and all other food products of animal origin liable to contamination or injury by exposure.

3. This By-Law shall come into force on the first day of A. D. 1913. Passed and enacted by the Local Board of Health of the City of Fredericton (District No. 1) this thirty-first day of July, A. D., 1913.
