Joe Jackson has batted for .400 or better on four diamonds this year, the fields being those of Cleveland, Chicago, Detroit and Boston.

At home the slugging southerner up to last Monday had piled up an average of .441; in Chicago his record was .419 and in Detroit and in Boston it was an even .400. What it will be on this trip remains to be
