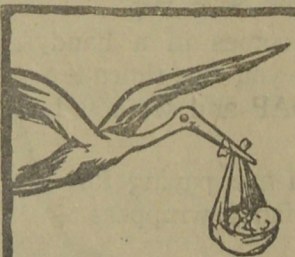

RIEGER GOES TO RED SOX WITH GOOD RECORD

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 1--Elmer Rieger, sold by St. Paul to the Boston Americans, came to St. Paul from the St. Louis Nationals in 1911, and despite lack of condition, split even in his 16 games that year. In 1912, after a long illness, he cut loose for 10 straight wins and was the star of the team. This year he has been the team's leading pitcher, winning 12 of the 18 games he has pitched.

Rieger is a delicate looking, slender fellow, extremely quiet and modest and there is nothing spectacular in his pitching. He has exceptional control, good curves and a tremendous fast ball, which he uses occasionally.

His success has been due rather to his head than to his arm; he is not a knockout pitcher, his rule apparently being to win with as little exertion as possible as he is not strong enough to stand continual strain. As a result, many of the games he wins shows as high as 10 and 12 hits against him but he can use the calmness when the game demands it.

In his three seasons here he has won 39 games and lost 23 and his batting average is .121. His habits are the best and his manner unobtrusive and he is popular with the fans because of his quietness and freedom from swell head.

JOE JACKSON
HAS HIT JOHNSON
FOR GOOD AVERAGE

Percentage Against Him is .456--
Has Passed .400 Mark on Four
Fields This Season.

Joe Jackson has batted for .400 or better on four diamonds this year, the fields being those of Cleveland, Chicago, Detroit and Boston.

At home the slugging southerner up to last Monday had piled up an average of .441; in Chicago his record was .419 and in Detroit and in Boston it was an even .400. What it will be on this trip remains to be seen.

On his visits to St. Louis Jackson has walloped the sphere at a .303 clip; at the Polo Grounds his record is .333 and at Shibe Park it is .133.

He has been very successful against the Washington pitchers in Cleveland having made 16 safeties in the seven games the Senators have played in Cleveland this year and he has been at bat only 23 times, the extremely high percentage of .694 being the result of his activities against Walter Johnson and the other Washington pitchers. His percentage for the season against Johnson is .456.

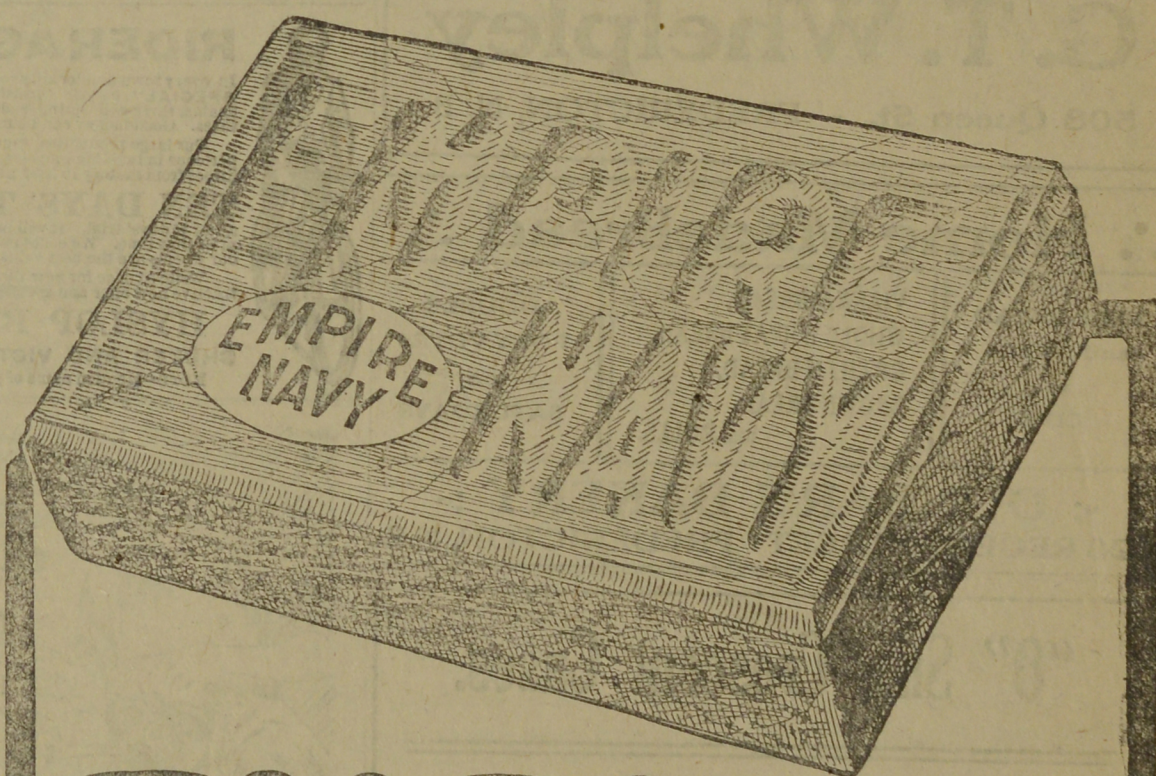
Jackson has hit at a .531 clip against the Browns on his home field .471 against Boston, .412 against New York, .400 against Detroit, .296 against Chicago and .286 against Philadelphia.

Up to last Monday he had made 40 runs and 79 hits in the Forest City and 24 tallies and 39 safeties on foreign diamonds.

Of the 44 long wallops then to his credit, 28 were manufactured in Charles W. Somers' ball orchard and the rest in other parks.
