HON. DR. PUGSLEY TAKES

PART IN NAVAL DEBATE

ENCOURAGE SHIPBUILDING.

Shipbuilding was about the only industry which was not favored by the Canadian tariff with protection. There was no duty charged to bring into Canada British-built ships or parts of ships for repairs. The people of Canada paid taxes for the clothes they wore, the implements they used and in many cases for the food they ate. Was it right that any form of aid should be denied the establishment of a shipbuilding industry? Hon. Mr. Hazen said he longed for the day when shipbuilding was to begin in Canada. Well, the way to establish shipbuilding was to begin and not to hope or talk about it. But what had this government done? Turned down the reasonable tender for the construction of naval vessels and more recently calling for tenders for a vessel for the customs service, had awarded the tender to a British firm because its offer was fifteen per cent. less than the lowest Canadian builders offered. The policy of the Liberal government had been to award such contracts to Canadian firms, if their offer was not more than twenty per cent. higher than the lowest outside offer. It was felt that this aid was due the shipbuilding industry of Canada.

The intimation that the British government would place orders in Canada when yards were established here for light cruisers, oil boats and similar craft was a sugar coating for the bitter Borden policy, but an ineffective one. Canada would have to buy the extra cost for construction here, and Mr. Churchill did not hold out the assurance of continuous orders and this would be necessary before a British builder could be induced to locate in this country.

NO TROUBLE TO GET MEN.

The Conservatives claimed that it would be impossible to get in Canada men for the Canadian navy. Admiral Kingsmill did not hold this. In his report he had pointed out that the fact that continuance of the service was not assured, had interfered with getting the men. The admiral had also said the large number of desertions by men who had enlisted was due to the fact that most of them came from inland points and were not accustomed to the sea life. They had found it uncongenial. The admiral had also stated that no effort had been made to enlist men among the fishing population of the Dominion, but when that effort was made plenty of suitable men would enlist. There was no doubt that this was the case. Canada today had 80,000 fishermen. There were many sailing from Newfoundland who would come into a proper Canadian naval service.

Dr. Pugsley read the agreement entered into between Britain, Canada and Australia by which Canada and Australia were to create naval services and the three were to co-operate in the exchange of men for training. By that agreement Britain had undertaken that the admiralty should lend men to Canada and Australia while the naval services of the colonies were being developed. Australia had loyally lived up to the terms of this solemn agreement.

"I agree with Sir Charles Tupper," said Dr. Pugsley, "that a tremendous responsibility rests on any government seeking to break this solemn compact."

Dr. Pugsley said that service in the Canadian navy could be made most attractive to the young men of the country and most useful to the Dominion both in the way of defence and in training men for useful occupations in private life. The United States had given the world an example of this.

THE MAIL'S MARKET REPORTS

St. John, January 18—(Special)—

The stock market during this week has reflected the inevitable results arising from unbridled talkativeness on the part of persons occupying high positions and lacking that element of common sense and restraint which should be expected from them. We have evidently entered upon an era when the iconoclast is to take the place of the constructionist. Business methods which have been the development of many years, are to be shattered in a moment and a commercial millennium introduced at once. No distinction, apparently, is to be permitted between wealth honestly and dishonestly obtained. Individual success is an indication of individual greed, the political economist and theorist is to take the place of the practical business man, and capital is under the ban.

That this experimenting with business and finance is dangerous must be admitted and the action of the stock market merely reflects the waning confidence of investors and the chaotic state of mind of the general public.

There is nothing more sensitive than capital and until fairness takes the place of prejudice and the powers that be, and to be, resort to a building up instead of a pulling down attitude, confidence will not be restored nor capital returned to its natural channels.

Fortunately for the country, accumulated wealth, enormous agricultural production and potential earning powers from the same are the underlying and neutralizing factors in the situation.

The industrialists are under the cloud of tariff changes and governmental attack.

MONEY.

The money market is in a peculiar condition on this side of the water. In the American cities money is easy and the supply is rapidly increasing. In London the same is substantially true, the Bank of England during the last two weeks having increased its proportion of reserve from about 30 per cent. to 49 per cent. In Canada, however, where, owing to the marketing of the agricultural products and the natural return flow of money through this process, there should be ease. There is still a very considerable stringency and the banks are continuing to ask stiffer rates. In fact, so far as Canada is concerned, owing to the immense amount of employment for all available funds, it does not seem likely that there will be any ease until well on into the spring.

How long the ease in the money situation in the United States will last it is impossible to say. Europe can use any surplus of money, as has been illustrated during the last ten days, by the export of American gold, and there is a very large amount of new financing to be done by the railroads and public utility companies, all of which will take advantage of any accumulation of funds to press their claims.

Taking the situation as a whole, we are inclined to the belief that there will be no low rates for money this year but that there will be an excellent demand for all surplus funds.


