COMMISSION RE-ELECTED OFFICERS FOR NEXT YEAR

Garry Herrmann Advocates Guarantee for Players' Salaries in Smaller Minor Leagues--No Revised Contract

Chicago, Jan. 16—The progressive spirit struck baseball today when the National Commission in a brief session heard Chairman August Herrmann, advocate a guarantee for players' salaries in "lesser minor leagues" and considering the proposed uniform contract designed to protect the unsuspecting players from "jokers".

The commission took no action on the contract matter—in fact nearly all of the baseball business so far as the "supreme court" is concerned was left unfinished when the commission adjourned sine die this afternoon. Illness of John H. Farrell of Auburn, N.Y. secretary of the National Association, who has not been able since early last month to prepare preliminary cases of players' appeals to the commission caused the postponement of their consideration as well as other matters.

The list of cases pending before the "supreme court" included the Buffalo club's complaint against the Philadelphia Nationals and the Atlanta club's complaint against the New York Americans.

The commission as expected re-elected Chairman Herrmann, Sec. John Bruce and Asst. Sec. A. J. Flanner. The chairman's report commented on the World's Series and other post season games recommends that inasmuch as each major league shares in the proceeds of the world's series, regulations be adopted to make it mandatory that the commission have supervision over every interleague series and that the World's Series rules apply to all such games.

None of the members of the commission would admit the Class AA salary question was brought up. It was expected the big minors would enter a formal protest against the \$6000 monthly limit but it was said none was made.

The Chicago Nationals today traded pitcher Madden, a left-hander, to Terre Haute for pitcher Rufus Gilbert also a left-hander.

Bangor and St. Stephen Calais Favored as the Two Places to Complete Four Club League With Fredericton and St. John--Correspondence Opened With Other Places--Northeastern League Scheme Not Considered at all

Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, representing the Fredericton Baseball Club, conferred with Mr. D. B. Donald of the St. John Baseball Club, at St. John yesterday. As a result of the conference Mr. Donald, who is league secretary, will get in communication with Bangor, St. Stephen, Calid and other places with a view toward seeing what clubs can be placed in the N. B. & Maine League in 1913. Woodstock and Houlton are out of it and Bangor and St. Stephen-Calais are the clubs favored locally to take their places. It is probable that the

meeting of the N. B. & Maine League will be held Saturday, February 1, a fortnight from today. What clubs besides Fredericton and St. John will be represented at that meeting is unknown.

The proposition to place St. John and Fredericton in the Northeastern League is not considered for a moment by those backing either the Fredericton or the St. John clubs. The league which will be furnishing baseball here next summer will be the N. B. & Maine as before, but it is a problem what clubs will be in it.

The list shows that quite a number of new pilots will be seen in the big show when the gong rings for the opening game next April. Joe Tinker of the Cincinnati Reds, Miller Huggins of the St. Louis Cardinals, Johnny Evers of the Chicago Cubs and George Stallings of the Boston Braves, are the new managers in the National League. Frank Chance of the New York Highlanders is the only new manager in the American League, although George Stovall of the St. Louis Browns, and Joe Birmingham of the Cleveland Naps may come under the head of new managers, as both took charge of their respective teams late last season. The matinee races to be held on the speedway on the river yesterday afternoon did not materialize. Some of the horsemen were present and had a few brushes.

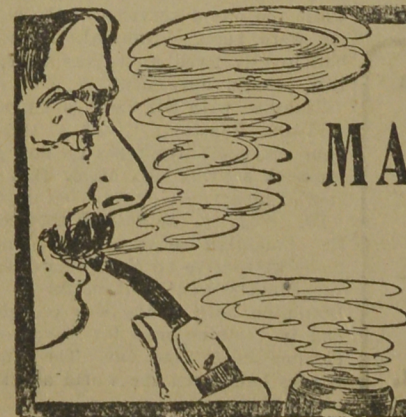
