

**SERIOUS FIRE**—Linden Hall the residence of G. E. Fenety was pretty badly damaged by fire Wednesday afternoon. A strong smell of smoke alarmed the inmates when going out of doors smoke was seen issuing from the walls. The fireman accompanied by a large crowd were soon in attendance and did their work very effectively. One of the ceilings that cost \$150 was ruined. One half the house was badly damaged by fire and water.




