CITY ELECTIONS

The Election for Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton for the ensuing year will be held on MONDAY 10th DAY OF MARCH NEXT at the following places viz:
Division No. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.

Division No. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City not included in Division No. 1., at or near the County Court House in the said City.
Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock a.m., of the said day of Election, and will close at the hour of four o'clock p.m. of the same day.

Nominations for the office of Mayor or Aldermen must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, on or before four o'clock on MONDAY the 3rd day of MARCH next, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors and the signatures attested to under oath.

Forms for Nomination may be procured at the City Clerk's office. A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all Rates and Taxes of the Candidate have been paid within the time required by law must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

PLEBISCITE

At the same time and place the Electors are requested by resolution of the City Council to express their preference of one of the following methods of selecting a Police Commission:

1. Shall the City Council continue to appoint from among the Aldermen a Police Commission?
2. Shall the Police Commission be elected by a vote of the Citizens in the same manner as the Mayor and Aldermen?

Mr. Munro then read the speech delivered before the Carpenters and Joiners Brotherhood of the City of St. John by Mrs. Curry of the St. John Branch of the Canadian Suffrage Association, and expressed the wish that it was permissible under the regulations of the House for one of the ladies of the delegation who were present in the galleries today to address the hon. members of the House on this subject because he felt that she would be able to bring home to the hearts of the hon. members the arguments in favor of their rights in this matter more convincingly than he could hope to.

Mr. Munro, in conclusion, said he trusted that all hon. members would give to his motion that fair, courageous and honest consideration to which it was entitled.

MR. SWIM'S SPEECH.

Mr. Swim, in seconding the motion, said that he desired to congratulate his hon. friend from Carleton on the able speech that he had made in favor of this most important motion. Four years ago Mr. Hatheway, who occupied the seat in this House that he now occupied, had introduced a resolution along similar lines as that introduced by his hon. friend this afternoon. On that account he felt that the responsibility devolved on him, not only to uphold the rights of women, but also to uphold the reputation of the seat in the House that he now occupied, particularly as regards the question under consideration.

It seemed to him that the women had proved themselves the equal of the men. Whether the men of the country possessed great wealth or held no property whatever they were entitled to exercise the franchise in provincial elections. This province had many women in business and possessing property and yet these women were forced to sit back and see the men, who had no property at all, have the right to vote. This question was becoming more and more a big one throughout the United States and Canada and more particularly in Great Britain. Hon. members must all admit that the day was coming when the women would have the right of franchise. As an illustration they had only to look at what was going on in the Old Country today. The women were causing the members of the House of Commons to take regard of their desires and while he didn't believe in some of the measures being pursued by the women in Great Britain he was fully convinced that the time had arrived when the women should have the same right to vote for members of the provincial legislature as they enjoyed in the municipal and civic elections. He noticed with pleasure that his hon. friend, Mr. Stewart of Northumberland, was in favor of this motion.

For many years the women have been kept down but they had established their worth and they were now taking prominent places in the various professions and in most every calling.

COL. SHERIDAN.

Mr. Sheridan said that he arose to say a few words as regards the duties which he felt devolved upon this House in the discussion of this most important motion. The question of women's suffrage was a great one and a question that merited the most serious consideration on the part of hon. members of this House. His hon. friend from Carleton (Mr. Munro) had pointed out that a large number of ladies had set forth the claim that they should be permitted to vote in provincial elections but he had utterly failed to show how many had made this demand or how many would be entitled to this franchise. If his hon. friend desired to show how many women wanted the right of franchise and what claims they put forth, he should have prepared a bill. His hon. friend said that he had many petitions in favor of the bill and he (Sheridan) knew that he had one from the county of Kent which was signed about six years ago. Many of those who had signed it were dead and gone and a good many of the petitioners had been boys but "every little movement had a meaning all its own." His hon. friend had failed to show the House what benefits the women would derive from the right of franchise.

While his hon. friend might be a ladies' man, he desired to impress upon him that the question was a great one and resolved itself into the matter of whether this House would bring the ladies down to the level of the men. He believed that hon. members considered the ladies way above the sphere of men and instead of lowering their dignity and respect it should be the duty of hon. members to lift them up. He considered that every hon. member who voted on this motion should vote honestly, and if he did not believe in the principle of women's suffrage, he should vote against the motion rather than give the ladies the impression that by voting for the motion, he would vote for the bill when introduced. If the women who held property were accorded the rights of franchise, how could hon. members

prevent the other ladies of the Province if they wanted the right to vote from coming and receiving it. He had learned on good authority that more divorces had resulted in the United States from political differences due to the fact that women's suffrage was in vogue than from any other cause. A comparison of the methods pursued by Mrs. Pankhurst and Carrie Nation, showed that the latter had undertaken to drive out the saloons in the United States, and had the sympathy of a great many people, but Mrs. Pankhurst went out to break the plate glass windows of the City of London, and instead of holding the sympathy of the people, had landed in jail. He strongly hoped that hon. members would recognize their responsibility and vote against the motion.

THE COMMODORE'S VIEWS

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) said he was very much interested in the address of his hon. friend from Kent, who had begun by dwelling upon the duties of hon. members in regard to the motion, and after impressing upon them the responsibility of carefully considering the bill he, Sheridan, had wound up by asking them to throw out the motion to introduce the bill. It seemed to him that the only way for hon. members to discuss the question was to pass the motion enabling the bill to be introduced.

His hon. friend among other things had said that if the women had any grievance in regard to taxation or their property they could rectify it by placing the right councillors in office, but he (Stewart) thought that there were many other questions which would demand the attention of women and even if they had a small grievance as to whether their tax bills should be 15, 25 or more cents less, that was only a very small matter and he hoped that the franchise of women was not merely a matter of dollars and cents. The intelligent women of the country were beginning to feel that they should have a voice, not merely in the affairs of taxation but on account of the whole broad reasons of citizenship. If one went back into history what did they find was the ruling influence. It was the man with the club. He was the lord and master, the woman was merely a slave, but after many years had gone by, a gospel of education and intellect began to arise, and afterwards took the place of the brute force. If men arose to become rulers of the world, the world advancing along lines like these for ages. Every generation had extended more or less power to women than the preceding ages, because injustice to the intelligence of the women, they could not deny them the rights the previous generations had refused them.

Statistics show that there were fewer women getting married for a living and a greater number going in for earning their own livelihood. If

the men were not going to marry and support the women surely the time had arrived when the women not only supported themselves but they should have the right to vote. Men owed a great deal to the energy and ability of the women. Hon. members must realize that they learned their multiplication tables from the female teachers who persistently taught and whacked the tables to the pupils while hon. members also owed much of the other education they had acquired to the energy of the ladies. It was that education that fitted them to take their place in public life today. What was the use of considering a bill for universal franchise when the bill it was desired to introduce provided for a limited franchise.

It was a fact that a number of women were enabled to vote in municipal and civic elections because they

were taxpayers and this bill merely provided for the extension of this privilege to this class of women in provincial elections. If these women gave intelligent votes for the county councillors why could they not give intelligent votes for their representatives in this House. He desired to ask hon. members as reasonable and intelligent men if they did not believe that if the women were trusted with the vote in municipal elections that they would not exercise that same privilege honestly and equally and intelligently if granted the provincial franchise. No reason had been advanced or could be advanced why the woman should not have the right of franchise in provincial affairs.
